Minutes

Attendance - Jim Dotterer called the roll. All Directors were present except Rick Baldwin, Tom Brown, Mike Iyall, Tom Holladay, Mike Nelson, Greg Squires, Bill Wright, Jeff Young and Jim Zobrist. It was determined that a quorum was present so the meeting continued.

<u>Treasurer's Report</u> - In Tom H's absence, Jim Dotterer reported the following account balances: checking account - \$3,211.53; money market - \$536.96; emergency fund - \$733.30; capital projects - \$2,834.89 and Homestreet investment - \$83,409.85. Jim also reported that taxes will be paid during the week of October 4th.

Membership Report - Rich Montecucco reported that current membership had stabilized at about 420 members.

<u>Documents Received</u> - Bob Gietz distributed flyers describing Rain Dee Voo 2005 Medallions that will commemorate the Lewis and Clark Corps of Discovery Bicentennial. Advance orders and reservations are available with a \$5.00 advance payment. For more information contact Bob at <u>duck-freak@msn.com</u>.

Nominating Committee - Bob G. reported that information concerning the committee and its efforts to identify prospective new directors had been placed in the October issue of the Plinker. Darrell Gehlsen was concerned because under the club's By-Laws members are elected as Directors and then the Directors confirm the newly elected Directors to their specific assignments, for example Vice-President. Jim D. agreed to discuss this point in his column in an upcoming Plinker.

Women on Target - Shirley Rheault reported on the recent Women on Target event. There were 24 Saturday participants and 27 on Sunday with total revenue of \$305. Total cost was \$608 which was covered by the \$700 grant previously reported. Of the 51 participants, there were 34 women, 6 girls (younger than 18), 7 men and 4 boys. Of the total of 51, 30 were first time shooters. The participation of only three individuals could be attributed to the club's booth at the Thurston County Fair. Jerry R. reported that some of the club's six revolvers, used in the event, were damaged and that he is salvaging parts to repair some of the damaged equipment. Rather than spending more money on the damaged equipment, Will Ulry suggested that the club purchase higher quality replacement revolvers. He moved that the club purchase two Ruger Single Six revolvers at the present time. This motion was seconded and passed. Shirley R. asked that the following individuals be recognized for their contributions to the success of this important undertaking: Doug Stein, Roy Williams, Dick Marcelynas, Rich Montecucco, Jim Ball, Terry Van Meter, Mike Nelson, Jeff Young, Mike Marrs, George Reichelderfer, Wiley Moore, Catherine Weed, Douglas Burt, Mike Jones, Herb Turner and Marie Heins.

Hunter Sight-In - Will Ulry reported that Hunter Sigh-In went very well. More people participated (6-7 people each day). He said that a number of participants were veterans of recent battles in Afghanistan and Iraq.

Recruitment - Jim D. reported that his son had posted CCRP flyers at the Fort Lewis Adventure Center. Shirley R. reported that so called public service (free) ads had been forwarded for publication by "The Olympian", but that they never were published. Bob G. suggested that the club place paid ads in "The Olympian", but Jerry R. pointed out that the anti-gun stance of "The Olympian" might lead to paid advertising being placed in inconspicuous locations in the newspaper.

Future Participation at TCF - Jim D. raised the question "should CCRP again sponsor a booth at the 2005 Thurston County Fair." He proposed that hardware (i.e. guns) be replaced with taped displays. Extensive discussion followed. Bob G. suggested that the club rent booths at events such as at the Farmer's Market. Chris Moffet suggested that local fire district safety presentations might provide a venue for placing a CCRP booth and Dave Akehurst suggested gun shows as a possible venue. Bob G. pointed out that it is very difficult to invite members of the public to a private club, such as CCRP, and Will U. asked that a single sheet listing all club activities that are open to the public be circulated. Ray Crisp pointed out that a one day/year open house might encourage new memberships and Darrell G's wife suggested that the club place a reader board at the club entrance to announce all events that are open to the public. Chris Moffett volunteered to investigate various stratagems to foster recruitment.

Fencing - Jim D. reported that fencing along the North side of the property was largely complete.

<u>Club House</u> - Both the club house sliding door and the roof will require work. The door is so heavy, due to its plywood covering, that the header is sagging. Jim D. described one approach, using "Lexan", which would be lighter and yet still stop rimfire bullets and arrows. Bob Jamison reported that moss needs to be removed from the roof and any leaks identified. He volunteered to remove the moss, locate the leaks and get estimates on repairing the door. Dave A. volunteered to assist Bob in spotting leaks.

Web Management Team - Shirley R. reported on a meeting involving four volunteers who will assist in maintaining and updating CCRP's web site. Due to the need to learn the web site, the learning curve will last until January 2005. Both Bob G. and John Cadoo pointed out the need to ensure that web materials are accurate and timely.

Open Gate Problem - Some members have been leaving the swing gate open so that gate's combination has been changed. Better to use the sliding gate unless an event is scheduled.

Work Assessments - Jim D. reported that club member Tad Tower of TNT Exterminators (360-459-7173) will trade pest control in and on CCRP buildings for his assessment. Let's support our members. It's a good exchange for us all.

<u>Historical Gunmakers Guild</u> - Bob G. reported forwarding an event application form to the Historical Gunmakers Guild. The organization is seeking a location to conduct training for its members, about 35 to 40 individuals on August 24 through August 28, 2005. After some discussion, it was agreed that the guild would be charged \$200 if they apply. Also, since some black powder shooting will be required, each participant will need to complete a "Release from Liability" form as in any other shooting event. If there are no other Range Masters present, Bob indicated that he would be responsible for that function.

<u>CWD Seminar</u> - Ray Crisp asked to schedule a seminar for the "Eyes in the Woods" organization on October 13th from 7:00 to 10:00 PM. With sponsorship by the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife, the seminar is designed to train folk in how to remove the brain stem from game to determine if the animals have Chronic Wasting Disease. Although an Orientation Class is also planned for that evening, Bob G. agreed that both activities could take place without conflict.

Adjournment - The meeting adjourned at 9:03 PM Respectfully submitted, John C.

Women on Target

After three years the Ladies Plinking Picnic's returned to Capitol City Rifle & Pistol Club; with a few minor changes. To reduce the amount of work involved in the event I decided to remove the "picnic" part. However, without a picnic I had to change the name of the event, which became "Women on Target."

Another change was to go "co-ed" for one day. The format for the Ladies Plinking Picnics allowed women to bring their daughters, but not their sons. The old format did not allow for dads to bring their daughters, and first time men shooters.

When I first heard about this phenomenon, that there are adult men who had never shot a gun before, I was amazed to think it could be true. So, for all the above reasons I decided that one day of the event be dedicated to first time men and boys shooters the opportunity to learn to shoot guns safely and accurately.

My fondness for this event comes from seeing the increase of moms as single parents in our society. The obvious attraction for teaching firearms to "moms" is their increasing need to be the protector of not only themselves, but of their children, as well. However, bigger than this is the fact that boys, and often girls, don't have the dads who, in prior generations would take them out and teach them how to shoot guns. At first glance that may not seem like a big deal, but it is!

Single mom families are the log jam for the firearms sports. Women, in general, are not attracted to machinery, and guns are very mechanical. That is why there are so many adult women who have never shot a gun. Moms by their nature don't take their sons or daughters out to show them the ropes of how to handle a gun for the simple reason that they themselves have no interest in it. Pretty soon we will have a generation of children who've grown to be adults and have never shot a gun before. Couple this with the anti-gun spin and paranoia the anti-gunners propagate, and the viewpoint that guns are bad, bad, bad will grow in staggering proportions.

The good news is more women have been getting into the shooting sports in the last five years. Not only are they doing well; they are knocking the socks off the guys in competition. (Admit it guys, you love and respect us anyway!) Slowly, women in the shooting sports are beginning to get some notice in the general public, and that is a good thing for women to see and be curious about.

After September 11th our whole country has awaken from its slumber to realize they, John and Jane Q. Public, need to be responsible about protecting themselves, individually and personally. More and more women have swallowed hard and stepped up to the challenge of being responsible for their protection against threats that have always been real, but had been readily ignored.

There is a swell of young women whose interest in shooting has been piqued. They now realize that a .38 caliber Smith & Wesson equalizes the playing field between her and a 350 pound hoodlum like nothing else. Just the fact that brandishing a gun in a threatening situation deters an attack 98% of the time where no shot is fired at all is very impressive, and comforting. Even the punk who's out for a thrill kill thinks twice (is that an oxymoron?) when his opponent is armed and is no longer viewed as the helpless victim.

I look at this as an opportunity, the silver lining in a black cloud. Now more than ever we need to be encouraging women, especially moms, to get out and take a class to learn how to safely shoot a gun. We need to loosen the chains around the view the next generation will have about guns, and now is the perfect time to start.

In 2005 we will put on the Women on Target events again. They will be held one weekend in July and one weekend in September. The Saturday's will be "women-only" classes, and the Sunday's will be "co-ed" classes. The dates will be announced soon. There are other great places to direct these gals to take classes, as well. The Firearms Academy of Seattle (located in Onalaska outside Chehalis) offers a free 5-hour handgun safety seminar one Saturday per month, February through November. They cover the legal parameters such as justifiable homicide, as well as an afternoon on the range instructing on grip, stance, as well as how to shoot safely. Call them at (360) 978-6100.

Marksman Gun Shop & Pistol Range in Puyallup has handgun fundamental classes and conceal carry classes, as well as gun rentals. (Renting is a great idea to do before taking the plunge of purchasing.) Their phone number is (253) 535-4363.

Another great place is Bull's Eye Shooting Range in Tacoma (this is a separate business from the store). They offer basic handgun classes and marksman training classes. 
