#### RAIN-DEE-VOO 2008 WINS THE WEATHER LOTTERY

First chance in 2008 for the western Washington buckskinners to hit the rondy trail was just south of Littlerock, where the Puget Sound Free Trappers of Capitol City Rifle and Pistol Club hosted their annual event. Starting at noon on Friday February 15<sup>th</sup>, Booshway Tom Brown opened the gates for a dry, cool session. Fair weather and cool nights greeted the 100 registrants, comprised of 11 under 12's, 3 juniors, 11 women and 75 men. 32 campers won the weather gamble and had at least bearable weather conditions. Over a dozen traders welcomed the patrons including a number of visitors from the community.

The full-size competitors had a range of typical events: Rifle, Trade Gun, Pistol, Knife & 'hawk and Archery trails. John Vladeff headed the shooting trails while Tim Sampson ran the Knife & Hawk event. Capable helpers: Jim Robertson, Bo Brown, Bob Parr, Chris Miller, Ralph Buckingham, Allen Cuniff, Tony Yaklich along with visitors Rich Pogue, Dave Perry, Lee & Jenifer McInerney and some others whose names may have escaped kept the trails working. Aggregate scores could combine either archery or Knife &'hawk with the Rifle trail. Will Ulry and the Capitol Bowmen managed the Archery event. Will and Glenn Sutt handled the Under 12 shooting events. Off the trail had the Ray Baker blacksmith exhibition along with the Trader's fair as well as the Club House kitchen to help pass the time. The WSMA held their annual meeting Saturday afternoon. Saturday evening gathered all comers to the Pot Luck which had Roast turkey provided by the Free Trappers to complement the results of the Dutch Oven competition. Segundo Steve Andrews was in charge of the evening's events in addition to Trade chief. Trader's Auction and Poker Tournament filled out the agenda. Lots of folks pitched in to get the details taken care of which included some of the "guests" as well as the hard-working Free Trappers. Shooting concluded with novelty events at noon Sunday with a stake shoot, Grub shoot and a Squirrel Gun match run by Bob Quick of the Green River Mountain men.

End result was the aggregate blanket and awards. WSMA's grant to the event provided special awards for Junior and Under 12 shooters as well as the muzzle loading rifle for the one shot buffalo hunt prize. WSMA Pilgrim medals also went to those attending a black powder event for the first time.

## **Beginner/Intermediate Match**

Ten shooters showed up for a breezy February match. We avoided the rain and were introduced to another new feature of a walk and shoot stage held in Bay 1. Shooters started on one mat and walked to a second mat where they shot six steel plates with the weak hand. The shooter then reloaded, walked to a second mat and engaged six more steel plates with the strong hand. Finally, the shooter reloaded, walked to the third mat and engaged six plates on a plate rack. Shooters were required to dispose of all plates at each stage before moving to the next. The three stages in Bay 2 were standard paper targets and bowling pins.

We will be introducing new features in future matches so that we provide different levels of difficulty to each level of beginner, intermediate, advanced. This match is intended to teach beginning shooters how to shoot without requiring them to demonstrate shooting skills they have not learned. The match also needs to provide increasing levels of difficulty for intermediate and advanced shooters.

With this in mind, stages will be set up so that beginning shooters will not be timed as will be the intermediate and advanced shooters. Also, beginners will usually be given shorter distances to shoot than intermediate and advanced shooters. Finally, whenever barricades are used beginning shooters will shoot from separate mats, and when stages require strong and weak hand shooting, beginners will use a two-handed grip. These changes will provide the more advanced shooters with more difficulty while ensuring that safety is maintained for all shooters. Beginners will be given the opportunity to learn and become comfortable with the basics before advancing to the more difficult shooting skills.

# MEMBERSHIP DUES RATES Dues and Renewal policies are effective September 1, 2003

Members will receive a statement 45 days before their membership expires. (Your renewal month is found on your mailing label.) The dues renewal date is the last day of the month in which members' "annual date" falls. Members' gate card will automatically "lock out" on their renewal date if they have not renewed, and their membership will be considered "inactive" for 30-days, during which time they may still pay their dues. After 30-days on "inactive" status the membership will be terminated. Should they wish to rejoin CCR&P past the 30-days "inactive" status, they must reapply as a new member and attend the Orientation class. **Membership fees**, collected at the time of the orientation classes are:

Annual dues \$70.00 for the first member of each household and \$35.00 for each additional eligible member of the household.

Initiation fee (one time) \$80.00 for each household and a refundable gate card deposit

fee of \$10.00 for each member.

In addition, each member is expected to devote 8 hours of volunteer service annually

or recruit two new members or pay an assessment of \$80.00.
