October 2010 Old Soldier Match

Come on out October 24 and shoot in the Old Soldier Match. Shooters use an issued military rifle for this 200 yard, 30 shot, prone position match. The rifles have been from the 19th and 20th Century (Springfield Trapdoors, 30-40 Krag, M1 Garand, Mauser's of various countries and calibers, Swiss and Italian rifles but not AR 15). Dig that old military rifle out of storage and come on out and have some fun.

The last Old Solder Match on August 22, 2010 went like this:

The match had 9 shooters to test their skills at 200 yards prone. The temperature was in the 60's with some wind. There was a new award for the top three at this match consisting of a military type "dog tag" identifying the match and 1st, 2nd or 3rd place.

First place went to Tony Minerd (aka Meisterschutze) with his Swiss K31. This is a 3-peat for Tony. He has won the last three Old Soldier Matches. Who is going to knock Tony off the podium at the next match? Second went to Gary Baldwin who was only 3 points behind Tony. Third went to Gary Thorson who was not far behind 2nd but Tom Krugman was on Gary's heels trailing by only 1 point. Fifth and Sixth were only 2 points apart. Thanks goes to Con Halbur for shooting his first time and keeping Harvey from being last.

After the Old Solder Match there were 5 shooters for the Carbine match. The course of fire was a 100 yard military type target at 50 yards and 100 yards. The target has a 5.5 inch bull and a 1.75 inch V ring (like an X ring). 25 rounds were shot at each target during a 2 minute time period for each. The most hits in the black bullseye would win.

- 2nd. Walt Schumacher score of - 26 w/4 'Vs'.
- 3rd. Fran Huntington score of - 26 w/3 'Vs'.
- 4th. Con Halbur score of - 21.
- 5h. Harvey Gertson score of - 14.

Beginner/Intermediate Pistol August/September 2010

The Beginner/Intermediate match drew 24 shooters for the August 21st match of which five were first-time shooters. Only three participants chose to shoot a second gun.

This was a 72 shot match with 5 stages. Stages 1 through 4 had varying shots per stage. Beginners were required to make at least one magazine change on each stage but had unlimited time to complete each stage. Beginners shot from the 12 yard line. Intermediate and advanced shooters made 2 magazine changes and were limited to 60 seconds to complete each stage. Intermediate and advanced shooters shot from the 20 yard line.

The first four stages used standard targets consisting of paper plates, texas star, plate racks, bowling pins, and dueling trees. The biggest problem was remembering the number of shots allowed on each stage. Stage 1 allowed 9 shots, stage 2 allowed 11 shots, stage 3 allowed 15 shots, and stage 4 allowed 12 shots. Targets were not overly difficult except on stage 2 where shooters had to shoot the bottom plate on the texas star first. Anyone who has shot a texas star knows that knocking off the bottom plate causes the other four targets to rotate and makes them very difficult to hit. Only a couple of shooters hit all targets on the star. The other difficult stage was stage 3 where shooters had to hit 4 inch plates placed in front of 12 inch plates without knocking down any of the 12 inch plates.

Stage 5 consisted of 25 targets. Shooters moved through six different shooting positions and shot at paper targets and steel plates placed at varying distances up to 40 yards. Shooters were allowed up 50 shots to hit all 25 targets and were limited to 3 ½ minutes total time. Several shooters exceeded the 50 shot maximum or exceeded the time limit. Shooters were not allowed to pass a standing target. All targets had to be down on a station before the shooter was allowed to advance to the next station.

John Barada was the best of the beginner class with a 66. In the intermediate class, Linda Hildebrand scored the highest with a 68. Several shooters were outstanding in this match and many will be moving up at least one class for the next match.

September 2010

The Beginner/Intermediate match drew 27 shooters for the September 11th match of which three were first-time shooters. Five participants chose to shoot a second gun.

The match was 72 shots with 5 stages. Stages 1 through 4 had varying shots per stage, the same as the August match. All participants shot from the 12 yard line. Intermediate and advanced shooters were required to shoot with the weak hand on two stages and with weak hand supported on the other two stages. Advanced shooters were limited to 60 seconds to complete each stage.

The first four stages used standard targets consisting of paper plates, texas star, plate racks, and bowling pins. As with our August match, the biggest problem was remembering the number of shots allowed on each stage. Targets were not overly difficult but several shooters turned some of the steel plates so that they couldn't be hit or that blocked other plates. Ron plans to continue changing the number of shots required on each stage so that shooters cannot get complacent.

Stage 5 consisted of 25 targets. Shooters moved through six different shooting positions and shot at paper targets and steel plates placed at varying distances. Shooters were only allowed 25 rounds to hit all 25 targets and couldn't pass any target that they missed. Each shooter's time was also recorded so that we can record their "hit factor." Ron plans to use this hit factor in future matches.

Dave Norcross was the best of the beginner class with a 66. In the intermediate class, Gayle Hageman, who drives all the way from Redmond, scored the highest with a 65. Ron Lohman was best of the advanced shooters with a 69.

All pistol shooters are invited to the Beginner/Intermediate match and you can really hone your accuracy skills with this match. If you know any beginners who want to learn safety rules and basic shooting skills, send them to our match.

Mark your schedule for October 9th for the next Beginner Match and we will see you at the Action Pistol Range. Remember, our matches are held the second Saturday of each month.

Shooters should bring a hip holster and a center fire pistol – semi or revolver – of 9MM or larger caliber, and at least 3 speed loaders or magazines. Cross-draw and shoulder holsters are not allowed. We recommend that you bring at least 100 rounds to the match so that you have plenty of ammo for the match and any practice shooting you do. **Any shooters who do not have the needed equipment may borrow equipment from Larry or Ron but we ask that they reimburse us for the ammo they use.**

We ask that shooters show up at 8 AM to help set up targets for the match and stay and help tear down the targets after the match has been completed. Matches are usually completed around 1 PM.

MEMBERSHIP DUES RATES

Dues and Renewal policies are effective September 1, 2003

Members will receive a statement 45 days before their membership expires. (Your renewal month is found on your mailing label.) The dues renewal date is the last day of the month in which members' "annual date" falls. Members' gate card will automatically "lock out" on their renewal date if they have not renewed, and their membership will be considered "inactive" for 30-days, during which time they may still pay their dues. After 30-days on "inactive" status the membership will be terminated. Should they wish to rejoin CCR&P past the 30-days "inactive" status, they must reapply as a new member and attend the Orientation class. **Membership fees**, collected at the time of the orientation classes are:

Annual dues **\$70.00** for the first member of each household and **\$35.00** for each additional eligible member of the household.

Initiation fee (one time) **\$80.00** for each household and a refundable gate card deposit fee of **\$10.00** for each member.

In addition, each member is expected to devote 8 hours of volunteer service annually or recruit two new members or pay an assessment of **\$80.00**.

Range Infractions

I have had 3 reports of finding high power brass where it is not to be used. YOU are jeopardizing your membership. The Blackpowder Range you may shoot Muzzle loaders 22's and shotgun only. When you are caught using 9mm and others you will be explaining to the board why you should be a member. The multipurpose has had the same problem. The High Power Range reported that vehicles are backing into the shooting shed and leaving the vehicle while shooting. Read the rules. This is not acceptable.
