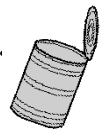

## **RAIN-DEE-VOO, 2013 Almost Wasn't**

For their first muzzle-loading event of the year for the Puget Sound Free Trappers of the Capitol City Rifle and Pistol Club hosted the annual "Rain-de-vo" on the roudy trail just south of Littlerock. Starting at 1:00 o'clock Friday afternoon on February 16<sup>th</sup>, Boosway Tim Sampson opened the gate to the trailwalk. We almost had to change the name since the only notable rain was a brief shower Saturday mid-day. Lots of buckskins & traditional capotes were evident on the trail with only a few camo jackets. Event registrants comprised a total of 70 shooters, composed of 53 men, 4 women, 3 juniors, and ten under 12's. Fifteen campers endured and the primitives took their damp canvas home to dry. Around a dozen traders welcomed the patrons including a number of visitors from the local community.

The competitors had a range of typical events: Rifle, Trade Gun, Pistol, Knife & 'hawk and Archery trails. Mike Nesbitt headed the shooting trails while Tim Sampson ran the Knife & Hawk event and Will Ulry carried on as Trade Chief. Capable helpers were: Segundo BO Brown, Registrar/Clerk Tom Brown, Allen Cuniff, Bob DeLisle, Don Kerr, Dave Perry, Ralph Birmingham, and Kent Dunn, along with perhaps some others whose names may have escaped, kept the trails working. Aggregate scores could combine either Archery or Knife & 'hawk with the Rifle trail. Will Ulry and the Capitol City Bowmen ran the Archery event and the Under 12 shooting events.

Off the trail we had the Trader's Row as well as the club house kitchen being operated by the Capitol City Bowmen to help pass the time. The WSMA held their annual meeting Saturday afternoon. Saturday evening gathered all comers to the Pot Luck, which had catered baked and fried chicken provided by the Free Trappers to compliment the results of the Dutch oven competition. Will Ulry was in charge of the evening's events. Our Trader's Auction and Poker Tournament filled out the evening's agenda. Lots of folks pitched in to get the details taken care of which included some of the "guests" as well as the hard-working Free Trappers. Dutch oven cooking was judged by Kerry & Derek Sotelo and Tom Brown to dispense awards donated by Lodge Cast Iron. "Sweet William" Conant cleaned up in the poker tournament.

Our shooting concluded with the novelty events which began at noon Sunday. Those were run by BO Brown, Kent Dunn and Pete Strobl, and matches included the stake-cutting shoot, Grub shoot and a Squirrel Gun match. The winning Stake shoot team was Rick Michal, Will Ulry and Ken Edminster. The True Squirrel gun match (.40 or less) winner was Will Ulry. The "Large bore" squirrel rifle shoot winner: Adam Sampson.

The end result of all efforts and activities came in recognition in the aggregate blanket and awards. WSMA's grant to the event provided special awards for Junior and Under 12 shooters, and WSMA "Pilgrim" medals went to those participating in a black powder event for the first time. Special awards of WSMA provided Trader's Bucks to lucky Under 12's; Ayden Guiberson & Silas Gillham plus Junior Austin Michal. The WSMA donation contributed to the muzzle loading rifle for the one-shot buffalo hunt prize. Scout Troop 310 lead by Craig Brown participated in the Saturday trails and six scouts were recognized with Pilgrim (new shooter) Awards. Recognizing our top contributors; Wholesale Sports sponsored awards for the Flint and Percussion Rifles, Randy Rice (Careful Loader) donated awards for pistol and trade gun, Panther Primitives for the Knife & Hawk, and Sticks 'n Strings (Bob Kindsvater) provided prizes for the Archery event.

# Capitol City Rifle and Pistol Club Board of Directors Meeting Minutes

## March 1, 2013

7:00 PM Convene and Call to Order by Vice-President, Cloyd Lamberson.

Flag Salute: Irene Hertwig

Directors present: Cloyd Lamberson, Irene Hertwig, Doug Simpson, Ron Lohman, Larry Lufkin, Laurel Vredenburg, John Mulhall, Larry Balestra, Fran Huntington, Gary Thorson. Directors excused: Chris Moffet Member Guests: Bob Jameson, Bob Gietz, Phil Lowe

Treasurer's Report: Laurel Vredenburg – Income \$12,011.20; February Expenses of \$5,901.10 Net profit of \$6,116.76. 2013 total \$25,487.83. Expenses \$8,054.73. Net income of \$17,508.96. Fran Huntington requested that individual range fund balances be made available.

Membership report: None

Old Business:

Background Checks: Discussion continued whether these were needed at the club level or not. Cloyd reminded that we're not really talking about background checks but NICS checks. Checking a person's CCW permit only applies to those who have them. If we check new members, we need to also check existing members. Do we need to add a statement whether a new member holds a CCW on the application for membership and if we do that, does that make us any safer? This question has been tabled for now. Bob Gietz reminds us that we currently have a statement on the membership application about the applicant being able to legally own or possess firearms covering this issue, which the applicant signs.

MP Range Contractor: Status is that Laurel had a check written to the contractor and now must check to see if that check was cashed.

Question was asked whether the two game warden's dues were handled correctly. Yes.

New Business

Range Rules: There was discussion regarding the need to move the Range Rules along. There are proposed changes regarding long guns on the new side bay at HP or what is now being called the pistol bay. As exists, the HP range rules apply. Proposed rules eliminate rifles and seriously question shotguns. In an effort to aid the new Range Directors with managing the range until the new Range Rules can be finalized and accepted, Irene made a motion, with Gary seconding, that the interim changes to the Range Rules be implemented until the Range Rules Committee reconvenes to amend or change the final Range Rules. Motion passed.

Tree harvest: Laurel has had Mr. Jackson look at and appraise part of the trees for harvest. The DNR permit has already been approved. Alder to be sold. We have some dangerous trees that need dealt with. Bob Jameson will have a chipper come in and the details of time still need to be worked out. A work party needs to be organized sometime around the 1st of April. The logging work will be done during the week. Irene asked how this tied in with the firewood work party Will Ulry was organizing. We know we don't want workers wandering around during the logging.

Match Fees: Gary Thorson questioned how match fees were to be collected and reported. Existing policy was explained. \$5 goes to club for event and other decided charges by the Match Director go into the target fund for the range. Larry Lufkin volunteered to provide a copy of the form he uses for reporting event revenue rather than using the existing Event Revenue Report.

Club patches: Phil Lowe had questions on which version of club logo to use for stickers. One has Olympia on it and borders. It was agreed that the version without Olympia and borders would be fine.

Sani-Can: Bob Gietz asked permission to get another sani-can. We currently have a trailer donated which has officially been dubbed the "Shepherd's Wagon". Permission given.

Ron Lohman reported that Ivan Lundgren has had a heart attack and is currently hospitalized.

Multi-purpose Range: Question was asked if we wanted a new and separate bids for the drain work and the berm. It was suggested that we add drainage issues on the AP range to one of these other bids. Larry suggested a contractor. He will obtain the bids.

We received a request to participate at the Cabela's "Great Outdoors Sales Event" with a table. John Mulhall and Laurel working the issue.

Septic and Water update: Laurel divided the issues as septic, water, and interior. Lackland to do initial assessment on Septic. We may need new designed system which requires permit. He will call on Monday to schedule. After the septic is assessed or done, water will be worked on.

HP Range: Fran would like to copy/modify plans used for pistol bay cover to obtain bids for replacing the HP shooting shed.

## High Power Shooters

This past Sunday, February 24<sup>th</sup>, was our first Old Soldier's Match of the 2013 season. For a cold, windy, but sunny February day we had a whopping turnout of 17 shooters. Enough that we needed to haul some portable target stands from the line shed 200 yards down range to have enough targets for everyone. The line was a little crowded, but friendly. It helped with keeping warm too.

Billy Clark's son Jacob and his friend Anthony Buono came out and shot with us. Jacob and Anthony are both Explosive Ordinance Disposal technicians with the U.S. Army. Thanks for your service, guys! Jacob and Anthony shot 600 yard reduced targets with match rifles – just for practice. And they posted some fine scores.

We had some mighty fine shooting with those old rifles. And to answer what one shooter once asked me – the Old Soldier is supposed to be THE RIFLE. Although some of us shooters might also qualify.

Following the Old Soldier Match, we had our first Carbine Match of the year. This year, we are using the CMP M1 Carbine Match course of fire. The Carbine Match is shot at 100 yards on a 100 yard NRA target. Course of fire is:

- 10 rounds slow fire prone position, in 10 minutes
- 10 rounds rapid fire prone position, in 60 seconds
- 10 rounds rapid fire sitting or kneeling position, in 60 seconds
- 10 rounds slow fire standing position, in 10 minutes.

We'll use the same M1 Carbine course of fire all year, and then we'll have season championship awards at the end of the year.

## Beginner/Intermediate Handgun Match

The March 9<sup>th</sup> match started out cold for the two BBQ cooks that hit the range at 4:45 AM. No stars or moon showing because of fog so it was like working inside a stove pipe during the setup of cooking equipment. We got the smokers lit by 5:05 and started dry rubbing the ribs for their 6:00 AM introduction to the smoker. We couldn't wash off the food serving tables yet as the cleaning solution would freeze as soon as it was sprayed on the tables. Once the ribs were on it was time for a good hot cup of coffee and boy did that hit the spot.

All of the food was on and cooking by 8:30 AM which gave me time to do the Safety Meeting before the match started. 35 shooters signed up and shoot 56 guns in this match.

The round count for this match was dropped from 72 down to 50 rounds until ammunition and reloading products are more available. The results are as follows:

All of the shooting was done, (2956 rounds 11 relays) all bays torn down, and all targets put away under lock and key before we all set down to eat at 11:30 AM. Now that is what I call efficient, thanks to a good crew! And NO! I'm not going to tell you what the rest of the menu was, your going to have to come to the next BBQ that we have to fine that out (ask someone that was there – it was good)!

**Mark your schedule for April 13 for the next Beginner Match and we will see you at the Action Pistol Range. Remember, our matches are usually held the second Saturday of each month.**

Shooters should bring a hip holster and a center fire pistol – semi or revolver – of 9 mm or larger caliber, and at least 3 speed loaders or magazines. Four are better. Cross-draw and shoulder holsters are not allowed. We recommend that you bring at least 100 rounds to the match so that you have plenty of ammo for the match and any practice shooting you do. **Any shooters who do not have the needed equipment may borrow equipment from Larry or Ron but we ask that they reimburse us for the ammo they use.**

### **MEMBERSHIP DUES RATES**

***Dues and Renewal policies are effective September 1, 2003***

Members will receive a statement 45 days before their membership expires. (Your renewal month is found on your mailing label.) The dues renewal date is the last day of the month in which members' "annual date" falls. Members' gate card will automatically "lock out" on their renewal date if they have not renewed, and their membership will be considered "inactive" for 30-days, during which time they may still pay their dues. After 30-days on "inactive" status the membership will be terminated. Should they wish to rejoin CCR&P past the 30-days "inactive" status, they must reapply as a new member and attend the Orientation class. **Membership fees**, collected at the time of the orientation classes are:

Annual dues **\$70.00** for the first member of each household and **\$35.00** for each additional eligible member of the household.

Initiation fee (one time) **\$80.00** for each household and a refundable gate card deposit fee of **\$10.00** for each member.

In addition, each member is expected to devote 8 hours of volunteer service annually or recruit two new members or pay an assessment of **\$80.00**.

**NRA membership (required)**

**Orientation class (required)**

**(GUESTS:** Members may bring their spouses and children under the age of 18 years old **as guests** as often as they'd like. Non-immediate family member guests are limited to two visits annually. Members **MUST** accompany their guests at all times, including spouses and children, and are responsible for the conduct of their guests.)
