## Open Letter to the Hunting Community of Washington State

For 15 years I have been involved in running booth at the Washington State Fair (formally The Puyallup Fair). The booth sponsored by Washingtonians for Wildlife Conservation, has one simple, but very important goal: To educate the public regarding the substantial role that hunting, and hunters have in wildlife conservation. We tell the truth. We dispel myths. We provide facts and information. We represent. We do something that is almost unheard of: We reach out beyond the choir, putting hunters in the light that we deserve. The light we have earned.

It's hard to calculate how many contacts we make during the 17 days of this event, which attracts one million people every year, but it is substantial. Some stop and talk, while many more just read the message banner, which reads "Sportsmen Contribute \$2.9 Billion to Conservation Annually." Others collect information to read later.

We have a lot of company in the "Northwest Outdoors: Go Play Outside" building at this fair. Hiking groups, native plant societies, conservation districts, Metro Parks, Mount Rainier National Park, Nature Conservancy, Foresters, Trout Unlimited and more. One group of volunteers kept track, and tabulated over 8,000 personal, face to face contacts. Of course, our literature and banner speaks for us, so those we don't talk to are *still* getting our message: The "hunters are conservationists" message.

I have always said that if hunters were half as committed to the future of hunting as anti-hunters are committed to ending it, we would have few problems to contend with. Our adversaries spreading lies, misrepresentations and half-truths about us as their everyday mission. Washingtonians for Wildlife Conservation's public outreach program is a proactive counter to that propaganda. The Washington State Fair, located in the same region that virtually controls the politics of this state is a very important event for the hunting community, and the reason that I am asking for your help.

This event can't and won't survive without you. That's a short sentence, so please read it again; it is the reason for my writing this letter to you.

This event is, by any standard, important, effective and extremely necessary. I would say that it, and those like it, are essential to ensuring your, and your children's hunting future. I know you're busy, so am I. I know you have limited time off from work, I'm in the same boat. I know you believe the general public won't listen, but they do, and we make an impact. Most of all, I know you think someone else will show up and fill a shift, but I can tell you for fact positive that "they" won't – That I have been using up to two weeks of vacation every year to ensure the 34 shifts at this event are filled testifies to that fact.

I am not asking for money, and I'm not asking for a lifelong commitment. I'm asking for a few hours one day in September to support the future of hunting.

## **June 2015 Old West Centerfires**

This was the fourth match of the 2015 Centerfire season and we saw six participants at the CCRP High Power Range. Weather was balmy and calm but Tony's hot coffee was just as welcome as if it was winter. Five of the regular Sharps shooters were joined by a guest, Jim Dickerman who was recruited by Mike Nesbitt. Jim crossed over from the Cowboy Action venue (wherein he uses the alias "Bones Aiken"). No achin' bones at all today as his scores confirmed right from the beginning of this match. Our course of fire was total 20 rounds, 10 shots each at 100 and 200 yard ranges. At 100 yards we used the 200-yard Muzzle loading rifle target and 200 yards used the modified military 200yard bull (same targets as we have used previously on the High Power Range). Our "behind the firing line" help included "Reliable Tony" tending the coffee pot, Dave Dolliver was our scorekeeper along with Doug Simpson and Tony assisting with the scoring.

Prizes, in the form of Sharps related merchandise provided by C. Sharps Arms plus additional prizes from the club were awarded to all shooters. Next OWCF at CCRP will be August 1st, 2015 on the Black Powder range and reminders will be sent. Targets will be double bull buffalo at 50 yards and the 200 yard ML Bull at 100 yards.

## **High Power Shooters**

The May NRA/CMP format High Power Service Rifle Match was held on the Sunday of Memorial Day weekend. We had a good turnout with 8 shooters on the line. Tony Minerd had the day's high scores in Prone Slow Fire with 199-10X, Prone Rapid Fire with 99-4X, and the match high score total with 484-18X. Tony was shooting an Eliseo R5 match rifle chambered in 6mm XC.

In the Service Rifle class, Gary Thorson was the match winner shooting an AR-15 with a score of 461-9X, and Gary also had the high stage scores for Service Rifle with Slow Prone 178-3X, Rapid Prone 96-2X, and Rapid Sitting 99-3X. Bruce Fockler took the high stage score in Slow Fire Standing with 89. Gary and Bruce have been practicing with .22's on the indoor range on Wednesday nights, and it's paying off with Bruce beating Gary in offhand!

In the "So you think you're a Sniper, huh?" challenge match, Gary Thorson and Ken Horton tied with perfect scores of 5 hits each out of 5 shots. They went into a shoot-off. Gary and Ken both hit their next unsupported standing shots on the 8-inch gong at 100 yards. Then they both missed their next shots unsupported standing at the 6-inch gong at 200 yards. The tie breaker was determined with supported standing shots (leaning against the roof post) at the 6-inch gong at 200 yards. Gary made the final hit, and Ken missed.

Ken made up for it by handily winning the Carbine Match with a score of 195-11V out of a possible 200 points. Good shooting, Ken!

#### <u>MEMBERSHIP DUES RATES</u> Dues and Renewal policies are effective September 1, 2003

Members will receive a statement 45 days before their membership expires. (Your renewal month is found on your mailing label.) The dues renewal date is the last day of the month in which members' "annual date" falls. Members' gate card will automatically "lock out" on their renewal date if they have not renewed, and their membership will be considered "inactive" for 30-days, during which time they may still pay their dues. After 30-days on "inactive" status the membership will be terminated. Should they wish to rejoin CCR&P past the 30-days "inactive" status, they must reapply as a new member and attend the Orientation class. **Membership fees**, collected at the time of the orientation classes are:

Annual dues \$70.00 for the first member of each household and \$35.00 for each

additional eligible member of the household.

Initiation fee (one time) \$80.00 for each household and a refundable gate card deposit

fee of **\$10.00** for each member.

In addition, each member is expected to devote 8 hours of volunteer service annually

or recruit two new members or pay an assessment of \$80.00.
