On May 29th and 30th also July 31th and August 1st, all ranges will be closed for the fence and range work parties.

Lets break this down to smaller projects. We need tools, so if you have chain saws, weed whips, steel post drivers, post hole diggers, shovels, hammers, grub hoes, Steel bar digger/tampers, smaller come-a longs (for stretching fence wire) and ATV's for supply vehicles, mark them with your name and bring them along.

As far as manpower needs, there are many. Not all are muscle power: Sighters to help keep the posts in line. Sign hangers, and people to tie red tape on the wire after it is stretched. Supply people for everything from keeping the fence crews supplied to getting water and soft drinks to the workers (ATV's will work here very well) Coolers with Ice for the refreshments are needed. And last but not least small work party coordinators.

We will have two basic crews, one working on the East West fence on the Northern border and the other on the South East corner going to the North to meet up with the other crew at our swamp in the North East corner. If we have enough members these will be broken into smaller groups. There are a few spots that hip boots would be needed.

Bring your lunch! We had thought of having a cookout but the logistics are just too much with everything else going on.

For those of you that would like to get some of your work hours in early, we need to mark the line. Get some supplies out on the line. Clear some of the areas of trees and heavy brush.

MEMBERSHIP DUES RATES Dues and Renewal policies are effective September 1, 2003

Members will receive a statement 45 days before their membership expires. (Your renewal month is found on your mailing label.) The dues renewal date is the last day of the month in which members' "annual date" falls. Members' gate card will automatically "lock out" on their renewal date if they have not renewed, and their membership will be considered "inactive" for 30-days, during which time they may still pay their dues. After 30-days on "inactive" status the membership will be terminated. Should they wish to rejoin CCR&P past the 30-days "inactive" status, they must reapply as a new member and attend the Orientation class. (All Life memberships are required to pay the \$15/member annual insurance fee.)

Capitol City Rifle & Pistol Club Board of Directors Meeting April 2, 2004 Meeting began at 7:02 P.M.

Minutes

<u>Documents Received</u> - Will Ulry provided several CCRP historical documents including: copy of April 1984 "Capitol Plinkings" and program and four statistical sheets from September 21, 1980 bullseye pistol match. Jim Dotterer provided the Incident Report for the March 20 intrusion by two juveniles onto CCRP property during a Hunter Education class session Flag Salute Bob Gietz led the flag salute.

Attendance - Jim Dotterer called the roll. All Directors were present except: Levi Bussanich, Ray Crisp, Tom Holladay, Ron Morton, Mike Nelson, Greg Squires, Noel Vaughn and Jeff Young.

<u>Treasurer's Report</u> - Tom Holladay was absent. Jim D. provided Tom's report as follows: all bills were paid, taxes due were paid; checking account balance - \$3,021.60; capital projects fund - \$2,976.57; emergency fund - \$911.67; money market - \$6,026.92 and long term investment - \$82,849.33.

<u>Membership Report</u> - Rich Montecucco reported the club as having 468 members. Jim D. announced that Levi Bussanich had submitted his resignation as co-director of the Action Pistol Range due to business conflicts.

CCRP At a County Fair - Bob Gietz discussed the potential of county fairs for outreach to prospective new members. He presented the results of his research into the club having a booth at either the Thurston County Fair (TCF) or the Southwest Washington Fair (SWF). TCF runs from August 4-8 10 A.M. To 10 P.M. (five days), requires no insurance, has free parking and would cost the club \$250 (which would include four season passes in other words those staffing the booth would not have to pay entrance fees). However, TCF reserves the right to reject any application received. SWF runs from August 17-22 (six days), requires insurance, has free parking and would cost the club \$325 plus insurance costs and would include 12 one-day tickets. In both cases, CCRP would need to provide its' own booth tables, backdrops and other materials, for example pictures, models, etc. Tom Brown pointed out that the SWF is considerably larger than the TCF and also asked if firearms could be brought into the fair grounds. After some discussion, it was agreed CCRP would sponsor a booth at the TCF, that only pictures or mock-ups, not actual firearms, would be displayed and that Chris Moffett, Will Ulry, Bob Gietz and Darlene Langa would head up the effort. Because of the length of the fair, more volunteers will be needed to staff the booth.

Incident Report - Jim D. described the newly designed incident report and indicated that Larry Lufkin had completed such a report recently regarding an incident that occurred during conduct of Hunter Ed training course. Two young boys, ages 7 and 6, were found on club property during the course while shooting was underway. No one was injured but the potential for injury was there. Chris Moffett described the incident. Jim D. indicated that Range Directors and Range Safety Officers need to obtain blank copies for use in the event of an incident.

<u>Orientation Schedule</u> - Bob G. discussed the need to reschedule certain monthly orientation classes to avoid holidays. Instead of the last Saturday of the month, the May orientation is now scheduled for Saturday the 22nd, November for the 20th and December for the 18th. For all other months, the schedule remains the last Saturday of the month.

Request from ATF - Jim D. reported that he had received a request from the Vancouver office of the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms (ATF) to use CCRP facilities for a picnic and to use our range(s) for firing their weapons including those that are full automatic. It was generally agreed that the use of full automatic weapons should not be allowed on the range. Jim indicated that to use club facilities they would need to provide an SOP for their shooting event, follow a club RSO's directions and not use full automatic weapons.

SOP's for All Events - The need for Event Applications was discussed. Several members indicated that Event Applications had been prepared for all events. John Cadoo pointed out that the procedure for preparing an Event Application required, in the final step, that the application be forwarded to the Secretary for filing. He indicated that he had not received any applications. Also, he pointed out that as part of the Event Application the sponsor is required to prepared an SOP and none of these had been received, either. Hedge Proposal - Jim D. indicated that Bob Jamison had offered to provide laurel seedlings if the club wished to install hedges. Several members pointed out their rapid rate of growth and intrusive character. A motion to accept the offer was moved seconded and defeated.

<u>Planning: Short/Long Range</u> - Short and long range planning is needed. Jim D. pointed out several areas where planning is needed or underway already particularly for 1) the entry road and 2) the clubhouse. Shirley Rheault asked when the year's major work parties are scheduled so that they can be adequately publicized. Chris Moffett agreed to establish these dates in the club's schedule. It was indicated that Bob Searle had asked what the scheduled dates were for Hunter Sight In sessions for the fall.

Gun Safety Orientation for the Public - Jerry Rheault, Will Ulry and Mike Iyall all spoke to the need to provide Gun Safety Orientation sessions for the public particularly for those for whom the club has no current offerings, like single Moms with kids. Jim D. suggested that such sessions be offered for \$25 for an adult or for a parent and child, what he called a "two fer." Jim Zobrist, although supporting the basic idea, pointed out that the club could easily be "swamped" by too many people suggesting that pre-registration be required. Bob G. said that the club should not establish its' own orientation curriculum but, instead use one provided by the NRA. Mike I. said that there should be a requirement that an adult accompany each child. A committee to investigate the possibility of conducting orientation sessions was created consisting of Bob G., Will U., Rick Baldwin, Jim Z., Chris M. and Barbara Rheault.

Perimeter Fencing - Referring to the incident involving children wandering on to the Hunter Ed area during a training session, Jim D. reiterated the need to move forward on establishing perimeter fencing. Using a chalkboard sketch, Bob G. described a proposal for installing perimeter fencing on the North, East and South sides of the property. The West side is already protected by our neighbor's fencing on that side. The proposed fence will vary between 47 inch field fencing and barbed wire fencing depending upon the perceived risks to the club and the terrain particularly swamp waters. Jim D. reported that the club had received a pledge for \$1,000 from an anonymous donor for constructing the fence. He requested and received a motion for \$4,000 to purchase fencing materials. The motion was seconded and passed. Jim also pointed out that the club's attorney had recommended "Danger" signs or similar signage to alert potential trespassers. Considerable discussion followed regard the wording of such signs. There was no agreement. Providing Food to Participants - For those who wish to provide food for participants in various events, Bob G. pointed out no licensing

is required if participants are club members. However, if non-club members are to be served, he suggested that they need to contact the Thurston County Health authority and get a definition of the situations where permits are required.

<u>CCRP Tax Classification</u> - Jim D. questioned what the club's tax classification is. Jerry R. said because of it's possible political activities, CCRP's current classification is 503 (C) 7.

Adjournment - The Board of Directors meeting adjourned at 8:48 PM.
