

The Big Work Days Are Coming!

On May 29th -30th and August 28th -29th all ranges will be closed for the fence and range work parties.

Hi Power Range, if you haven't been out to this range, Rick Baldwin and his helpers are making this an interesting range. There are steel gongs at 100 and 200 yards. These are mounted in BIG tires. There are 13 inch gongs which are the size of a 9 ring slow fire target and some 8 inch gongs with a three inch hole that has a smaller gong mounted behind the hole. These ring like a church bell when you hit them. Just remember, no armor piercing ammo. Also Rick has started to convert some of the old target frames in to new shooting benches. These are very sturdy and have wheels on the front legs so they can be moved with out loosening up the bench.

The cowboys and gals are coming next month to the Action Pistol Range. Several of our new members have taken on the job of setting up a cowboy shoot the last Saturday of each month. This will be an interesting event for both shooters and spectators. They are planning to have the first shoot the last Saturday of the June.

The fence is coming along with the major effort of Bob Gietz and his helpers.

We will be reviewing some timber cutting to clean up some trees with root rot, harvest some mature stands of Alder and some thinning to increase the value of future crops.

The Mike Fink elimination shoot went to Tim Sampson. Josh Brown won the split-ball elimination. Don Blackburn came to run the 'Hawk throw re-entry which was won by Bob Gietz. The Poker Luck Re-entry went to Bob Gietz. The final event was a sucker-grub-shoot, which helped to distribute the goodies around the group a bit. Single Shot Shoot-off

The first ever Single Shot Shoot-off will be held on Saturday June 26th on the high power range. Shooting will start at 9:00 AM. This is an opportunity for all owners and admirers of the single shot rifle to get together, see some classic weapons, share experiences, and shoot a friendly competition. In addition to the classic Winchester Hi-Walls, Ballards, and Stevens falling block rifles there will be modern versions e.g. Hoch, Ruger, Miller and Martini to name a few. Hopefully we will have other current production rifles such as Savage, H&R, Thompson-Center etc. to cover the wide variety of single shot types.

Rules are quite simple – all non bolt-action single shot rifles are eligible. There are NO OTHER RESTRICTIONS!! No weight limits, any type bullets, any sights, etc. Competitors are asked to shoot the same weapon/sight combination to provide some indication of relative performance.

ASSRA 100 yard and 200 yard targets will be used (red/black reversible to accommodate both scope and iron sight shooters). Course of fire is two targets (10 rounds each) at 100 yards and two targets at 200 yards-1000 possible points. All firing will be from the bench.

This will be a shoulder-to-shoulder match; relays will be necessary. Please come sighted in and ready to shoot. There will be NO sight in period prior to the match, but, the 30minute time limit for 10 record rounds should provide sufficient time to “fine tune” on a sighter target-please provide your own sighter targets.

Scoring will be “near edge”—competitors will score their own targets and turn them in. Top scores will be verified by the match director. Awards will be presented-overall 1st place either a one year membership in the American Single Shot Rifle Association (with magazine subscription) or a three volume of Grants Books on single shot rifles. Token awards will also be given for top rimfire, top iron sight, and overall champion.

As you can see, this is a different type of single shot match. In addition, there will also be a “Spirit of the Single Shot” Event---KNOW YOUR RIFLE.

MEMBERSHIP DUES RATES

Dues and Renewal policies are effective September 1, 2003

Members will receive a statement 45 days before their membership expires. (Your renewal month is found on your mailing label.) The dues renewal date is the last day of the month in which members' "annual date" falls. Members' gate card will automatically "lock out" on their renewal date if they have not renewed, and their membership will be considered "inactive" for 30-days, during which time they may still pay their dues. After 30-days on "inactive" status the membership will be terminated. Should they wish to rejoin CCR&P past the 30-days "inactive" status, they must reapply as a new member and attend the Orientation class. (All Life memberships are required to pay the \$15/member annual insurance fee.)

Minutes

Capitol City Rifle & Pistol Club
Board of Directors Meeting
May 7, 2004

Meeting began at 7:11 P.M.

Documents Received - Will Ulry provided copies of completed event applications for the following: Capitol City Junior Rifle Club; Rain-de-Vous 2005 and Puget Sound Free Trappers Monthly Shoots; Speed Steel Event; Action Pistol; Tumwater High School Rifle Team; IR50/50 (benchrest .22 rimfire rifle); Small Bore Silhouette; Single Shot Shoot-Off; Beginner/Intermediate Pistol League and Black Powder Cartridge. Also Will provided Event applications for the 2004 Rain-de-Vous and PSFT Monthly Shoots. Will provided a draft copy of a revised, and much shorter, Event Application (see action below). Jim Dotterer provided an Incident Report (see discussion below); a copy of a memorandum from Board Member Darlene Langa outlining her concerns about Cowboy Action Shooting at CCRP (see action below); an Event Application for CAS; a copy of the Washington Pest Services and Consultants Co. report on the CCRP clubhouse dated 4/27/04; two copies of the Thurston County Title Company's report on CCRP's property dated August 15, 2002 and a signed contract between CCRP and Bill Wright, and Vicki and Bill Steigner for committing CCRP to underwrite \$2,779.61 in costs to set up CAS at CCRP. Jim also provided copies of Single Action Shooters Society copyrighted CAS Match Director's Guide, Range Operations Basic Safety Course (Level 1) and Range Officer Training Course (Level 2) (see discussion below).

Flag Salute Darrell Gehlsen led the flag salute.

Attendance - Jim Dotterer called the roll. All Directors were present except: Darlene Langa, Mike Nelson, Jeff Young and Greg Squires who was excused.

Treasurer's Report - Tom Holladay reported the following balances: checking account - \$995.83; capital projects fund - \$2,294.37; emergency fund - \$731.80; money market - \$4,055.00; Homestreet Bank (long term investment) \$82,943.50. Tom reported that as of 5/7/04 18 members failed to pay their dues in March and 20 in April.

Membership Report - Rich Montecucco reported the club as currently having 479 members.

CCRP Website - Jim D. introduced discussion regarding the CCRP website. He pointed out that currently, CCRP spends about \$5,000 per year to publish the Plinker and that placing the Plinker on the website could achieve savings for the club. Ray Crisp pointed out some advantages of placing the Plinker on our website such as being able to refer to past issues at any time. Jim D. also mentioned that SOP's have not been installed on our website because they haven't been approved. Bob Gietz questioned if publication on the website would be equivalent to publication of a hard copy Plinker as envisioned in CCRP's By-Laws. Darrell Gehlsen noted that website registration offers members the opportunity to elect either to receive the Plinker or read the Plinker on our website. Mike Iyall concluded that for those who elect to read our website, publishing on the website would be equivalent to publishing a hard copy Plinker.

CCRP at Thurston County Fair - Bob Gietz said that the Thurston County Fair had approved CCRP's application. Gun displays have been approved provided they are in cases and removed each evening from the fairgrounds. CCRP will need to provide staffing for the booth from August 4-8 and Bob suggested that each CCRP discipline provide staff for one day (from 10:00am to 10:00 PM). He proposed that we hand out copies of the CCRP. Jim D. suggested that NRA gunlocks also be made available to fair goers. Bob said that the overall cost to CCRP would be \$550 and moved that that amount be authorized by the Board for a 10 foot by 10 foot booth. Bob's motion was seconded and passed. Bob requested that the Black Powder discipline staff the booth for August 4, but staffing for other fair days was deferred to a future meeting.

Work Parties - Shirley Rheault announced that seven members have signed up for the May 29-30 work party. In discussion, it was noted that non-members who may wish to help on work parties must sign a release of liability. It was moved, seconded and passed that funds for purchase of five shovels and five rakes be allocated. However, Linda Holladay said that her employer could furnish these tools for the club to use.

Ladies Plinking Picnic - Shirley R. announced that the plinking picnics has been scheduled for the weekend of September 18-19, and that the second day, 9/19/04, will provide for both men as well as women.

Personal Protection and Pistol Training - Will Ulry announced that John Mickel and Jim Zobrist had already started to institute the NRA's "First Steps" program. This program will require a number of instructors who must be trained before they, in turn, may train members of the public. Materials for training an instructor will cost \$50 each. Having some idea of how many from the public will want to be trained will help to determine how many instructors will be needed. Will U. indicated that advertising for instructor training will be placed in the Plinker. Income from training conducted on a range will be shared with that range.

Event Application Form - Will U. presented a new version of CCRP's Event Application Form. The new form is considerably shorter than the earlier form. He outlined some of its advantages. It was moved, seconded and passed that the new form be adopted.

Fence Building - Jim D. announced that initial efforts in fence construction ran into some boundary disputes with neighbors but that fencing materials had been purchased and stored

Incident Report - Jim D. described an incident involving arrows from Capitol City Bowmen's 3-D event going off range

near the first station towards the West. Ray Crisp pointed out that these off range arrows likely resulted from the arrows hitting flat surfaces and glancing off in directions other than those aimed. The basic fix is to not aim arrows in a Westerly direction at that point.

Bob Searle's Match – Will Ulry announced that a special match commemorating Bob Searle's contributions to CCRP would be conducted on May 16th with trophy presentation at 10:00 am.

Tractor Purchase – Ray Crisp and Jerry Rheault reported on the club's options in a possible purchase of a tractor. They both noted that the capabilities of a possible club tractor would directly relate to its' cost. In other words, increasing increments in size, power and capabilities are matched by cost increases. Will U. noted past problems with buying used equipment. Darrell G. suggested that the club rent tractors of various sizes to determine precisely how big a tractor would be suitable for purchase. No conclusion was reached.

Cowboy Action Agreement – Jim D. reported on the prospect of initiating Cowboy Action Shooting at CCRP. He noted that Bill and Vicki Steigner and Bill Wright (S&W) had submitted an Event Application to conduct a Cowboy Match on the 4th Saturday of each month at the Steve May Action Pistol Range together with a new shooter orientation and practice session on the following Sunday. (Note: A copy of the completed Event Application containing a full description of the event will be sent to you on receipt of your e-mail request to ceciljune@outdrs.net. No U.S. Mail). S&W have purchased, out of their own funds, \$2,779.61 of equipment (start-up expenses) to conduct the Match. The basis for CCRP reimbursing S&W will be as follows: match fees to be \$10.00 per shooter per day, except juniors at \$7.00. After each match, all money will be turned in to CCRP's Treasurer as soon as possible, but no later than the following Club meeting. CCRP shall retain \$5.00 per shooter and from the remaining \$5.00 (\$2.00 juniors) per shooter CCRP will reimburse S&W incidental match expenses when they present receipts. CCRP will retain the remainder of the match receipts until enough money has been accumulated to pay back S&W's start-up expenses. Each September match shall be a fund raising match with CCRP waiving its \$5.00 per shooter. Bill Wright and the Steigners retain ownership of the steel targets, target stands and timers until such time as the debt is repaid in full. The Safety Officer, Will U., had reviewed the CAS rules and said they were excellent. Bill Wright described some of the CAS safety rules. Implementation of one rule would require CCRP to construct an eight foot wide by eight inch thick cover immediately adjacent to the Econo-block walls of the shooting bays. Ron Morton, Range Director, offered his support for the proposal. It was moved that the club approve the Event Application and agreement with S&W. This motion was seconded and passed. Jim D. signed the agreement, as did Bill Wright and the Steigners.

Boy Scout Merit Badge – Rich Montecucco and Rick Baldwin announced that they would be assisting six Boy Scouts to earn a Merit Badge. All club costs will be recovered.

Adjournment - The Board of Directors meeting adjourned at 9:06 PM.
