Targets will be shot on high power range at 200 yards from bench rests. 30 shots at 15 minutes per 10 rounds. Only black powder designed cartridge can be used. Popular cartridges are 45-70, 40-65, 40-70 SS or 40-70 B.N., 38-55, 32-40, and several others! Lever actions are allowed this year along with single shot rifles and replicas. Entry fee \$10.00. Matches will start at 11:00 A.M.

APRIL BLACKPOWDER MUZZLE LOADING SHOOT

Following a brief break for the local Spring rendezvous, the monthly shoot and Free Trapper meetings will resume on April 17th. Location is the Black Powder Range. Early birds can start at 1100 with the main event starting at Noon. Program will be a bit different with individual match awards based on scores for each type of firearm rather than individual targets. That will provide a top three award for Rifle, for Pistol and for Trade Gun. The aggregate award from the blanket will be optional for those who choose to donate an item of Approx. \$5.00 value and will be based on combined scores with rifle and pistol. Primitive dress points will be awarded. Shoot fee: \$10.00 plus optional blanket prize donation. Proposed course of fire will be: Rifle: 5 shots on gongs 50-100 yards, 5 paper at 50 yards; Pistol: 5 shots on gongs, 5 on paper all at 25 yards. Trade Gun: 2 gongs at 25 or 50 yards, 3 on paper at 25 yards, 2 flyers (at the end of the shoot). Optional events will be the re-entry 'Hawk Throw with Don Blackburn, and the re-entry Poker Luck target. A brief Free Trapper meeting will involve suggestions and plans for the May "Spring Hunt" shoot on May 15th.

Dues and Renewal policies are effective September 1, 2003

Members will receive a statement 45 days before their membership expires. (Your renewal month is found on your mailing label.) The dues renewal date is the last day of the month in which members' "annual date" falls. Members' gate card will automatically "lock out" on their renewal date if they have not renewed, and their membership will be considered "inactive" for 30-days, during which time they may still pay their dues. After 30-days on "inactive" status the membership will be terminated. Should they wish to rejoin CCR&P past the 30-days "inactive" status, they must reapply as a new member and attend the Orientation class. (All Life memberships are required to pay the \$15/member annual insurance fee.)

Minutes

Capitol City Rifle & Pistol Club
Board of Directors Meeting
March 4, 2005

Meeting began at 7:04 PM.

Flag Salute - Ray Crisp led the flag salute.

Documents Received - Treasurer's profit and loss statement for 1/1/05-3/4/05 (Note: The P/L statement shows a Net Income of -\$480.23 for this period) 2) "Match Projection for 2005" form 3) CCRP Centerfire Pistol Match report for 1-16-05 4) copy of check covering shooters' fees for Small Bore Silhouette Match 1-16-05 5) Black Powder Cartridge Match report for 5/15/04 6) Black Powder Cartridge Match report for 8/21/04 7) CAS Match report for 2/26/05 and 8) Rain-de-Vous report for 2-18-05 through 2-20-05.

Attendance - Jim Dotterer called the roll. All directors were present except Jim Greeves, Ron Morton, Noel Vaughn and Jeff Young. Mike Iyall and Chris Moffett were excused.

Treasurer's Report - Tom Holladay reported the following account balances: checking - \$1,875.63; capital projects - \$1,791.40; emergency fund - \$788.80 and Homestreet Bank - \$83,907.29. Tom also reported the following: property tax of approximately \$2700 was paid and liability insurance of approximately \$3,521 was paid. Money was borrowed from the capital and emergency funds to make these payments to be paid back when the checking account is stronger. Deposits for February were made to the emergency fund of \$810.00 and to the capital projects fund of \$392. CCRP received \$3,366.10 from the 2005 Rain-de-Vous and \$782.00 from CCB.

Membership - Rich Montecucco reported that membership currently totals 384. He and Linda Holladay are working to reduce the number of duplicate cards.

Gun Show - Rich M. reported that CCRP's table at the gun show provoked a lot of interest. He is still looking for volunteers for future gun shows and reminded everyone that it is a very easy way to complete your assessment obligation.

Thurston County Fire Inspection - The inspector will come to CCRP's property on Wednesday, 3-9-05 at 1:00 pm.

CCRP Web Site - Darrell Gehlsen made a brief presentation about CCRP's new web site, CCRPclub.org. It is up and running and can provide members with a variety of services. In addition to being able to receive your "Plinker" on the Web (and save the club the expense of mailing the newsletter), members will find useful links and can send e-mail to any director. All e-mail addresses are protected so there is no risk of incurring spam by using the site. Rich M. suggested that the orientation class dates be added to the site.

Wooly Boggler - Ray Crisp reported that 158 people participated. He said it was a good weekend and there were no problems. Regarding publicity for the WB, he was impressed by how effectively Bob Gietz had publicized the Rain-de-Voo. Jim D. suggested that in the future promoters of the WB, Cowboy Action Shooting and similar events consider "cross-fertilizing" their events with activities found in other events like Dutch Oven Cooking and primitive archery to further their appeal.

Rain-dee-Voo - Bob Gietz reported that there were 127 registrants (102 adults and 25 juniors) with 37 registered campers. Also, there were many visitors who enjoyed the Traders' Fair. Bob expressed appreciation for the initiative exercised by "The Olympian" staff in publicizing the event.

Standing Rules - John Cadoo distributed paper copies of proposed changes to a revised draft of the S.R. previously distributed by e-mail. These proposed changes will be entered in the draft and distributed to Directors by e-mail for discussion at the April meeting.

Money for Budgeting - Jim D. commented on the need to prepare adequate budgets for this year. He suggested that as much as \$1,000 may be tied up in "cuff" accounts maintained by the various disciplines, that is not in the treasury. He stated that the club needs to know what money is available for budgeting. Commenting on one of the major upcoming budget items, Bob Jamison said that between \$700 and \$1,000 in materials will be required to repair the clubhouse sliding door. He is also getting proposals on repairing the clubhouse roof.

Buildings and Grounds - Bob Greenman reported that he will be caring for the clubhouse and the immediate vicinity. Jim D. briefly discussed his efforts and those of others to repair the entry road. Bob G. pointed out the need to trim brush along the entry road but, was particularly concerned that the road itself requires major repairs and the appropriate season for making those repairs is fast approaching, i.e. June through August.

Hunter Sight-In Program - Jim D. again solicited a volunteer to head up this program and Greg Squires volunteered. Jim commented that Harvey Gertsen, prior to this event each year, has been sending out announcements to those who participated in the past.

NRA 2002 Grant Paperwork - Jim D. and Greg S. reported that the paperwork on this grant was completed and forwarded to the NRA but, that there has, as yet, been no response from the NRA.

Reader Board - Jim D. suggested that hanging signs under the existing sign structure could serve to publicize events to passing motorists. He said that there are existing sign boards housed in a shed on club property and that by painting a "you are here" sign, CCRP could facilitate visitors locating sought events. Bob G. and others pointed out that trees and other vegetation on adjacent property would need to be cut back or removed to provide adequate visibility for reading the signs. Discussion followed and Jim indicated he would contact property owners.

Budget Requirements - Jim D. indicated that a "Match Projection for 2005" form was sent to all Directors. This form should be completed by each Match Director, turned into their respective Range Directors and forwarded to the President prior to the April meeting.

Associate Membership Revisited - Several Directors suggested that there might be some advantage to re-establishing

Associate Memberships deleted from the current By-Laws. No decision was reached.

CCB/CCRP Agreement - Jim D. has convened a committee to draft an agreement that will satisfy the IRS. Bob G. questioned how CCB members could come on the property unless also CCRP members. There was considerable discussion regarding whether CCB members need to also be members of CCRP in order to come on the property, i.e. because of liability and other related issues. Greg S. pointed out that the new by-laws made no provision for associate memberships and so the by-laws would need to be changed.

Club Logo - There was some discussion regarding the need to obtain the club logo. Ray C. said he will check with "Deer Creek", the firm that originally developed the logo, to see if they retained the art work.

CCB Accounting Records - Ray C. furnished Jim D. with copies of CCB's accounting records from 1988 to present.

Road Repair Timing - Bob G. asked the President for time to present further information regarding the timing of needed repairs to the entrance road. In view of how late it was, his request was denied.

Adjournment - The meeting adjourned at 8:30pm.

IN REMEMBRANCE

ALLEN (BUD) BRATLIE -- Both NRA and CCRP Life Member died January 30, 2005 in Anchorage Alaska. Bud loved Alaska but opted to be interred in the Forest Memorial Cemetery in Olympia with other members of his family. There were many friends and family in attendance and an Honor Guard from the U.S. Army. Bud lied about his age and enlisted in the Army at sixteen. He turned seventeen serving in Korea as a member of a tank crew.

After the Army, Bud followed the construction trade and retired from the Operating Engineers Union.

Bud joined CCRP in the mid sixties and was a real force in developing our old Hawks Prairie Range and getting our present one started. He was very active in all phases of Club affairs. He could and did swing a hammer, finish cement, run a bulldozer, borrow and run his boss' backhoe on a club project half the night after working all day. For several years he and his wife, Jaunita, put out the Plinker which they printed on our mimeograph machine. Jaunita was also a very active member but her contributions to the club are a story by themselves. In addition to these club chores Bud found time to earn an NRA Masters classification in both large and small-bore rifle and a reputation as hard core rifle competitor. He really loved to compete.

In 1978 Bud and Jaunita moved to Alaska and have been sorely missed by everyone who knew them. A while after they were settled in Alaska, the State Championship Matches were held in town of Kenai which was most of a days drive from Anchorage where the Bratlie's lived. Bud thought this would be a good time to meet a few of the Alaska competitors so when he had finished work for the week he left home and drove most of the night. He arrived in Kenai in time to catch a couple of hour's sleep in his car before the match started. He parked next to the front gate so the traffic noise would wake him. He seemed to thrive on adversity because although no one knew him when he arrived all the competitors knew him when he left as the new Alaska State Large-bore Rifle Champion.

Bud was a great guy and a devoted club member.

April 1st Deadline!

The state Interagency Committee for Outdoor Recreation (IAC) is looking for four volunteers with expertise in black powder shooting, hunting, hunter education and pistol sports to serve on its Firearms and Archery Range Recreation Program advisory committee.

The committee advises IAC on policies and funding for firearms and archery ranges open to the public in a grant program where grants are awarded every other year. The Firearms Archery Range Recreation Program has been an important source of grant funding in Washington since its inception in 1994. It has provided more than \$2.5 million for shooting sports facilities. Through the years, the advisory committee has provided guidance for funding more than 70 projects.

Generally, members are asked to attend up to four weekday meetings a year to review and rank projects for funding. Per diem is provided. The ideal candidate has a statewide perspective in one of the four requested disciplines, is active in the named sport, has a good grasp of range recreation issues, can attend meetings and helps IAC attain a committee that represents the state's diversity.
