High School Rifle Team Needs Your Help

As we grow older, most of us realize that it's now *our* responsibility to keep the shooting sports alive by passing along the gifts of marksmanship and gun safety to the younger generation. And now, CCRP members have a real opportunity to do just that.

The Black Hills High School Rifle Team needs coaches, range safety officers and other volunteers for its 2012-13 smallbore rifle season. Without support and training the school will be unable to field a team this fall.

The high school competitive rifle season starts in early October, and runs through the end of February. Interscholastic matches begin in November.

Black Hills team practice is held Mondays and Wednesdays from 3:00 - 5:00 p.m. in the CCRP Indoor Range.

Although many consider rifle an individual sport, high school shooting teams win or lose by their total number of points -- just like basketball. More importantly, their success depends upon a larger team of coaches, parents, volunteers and fellow students. Take away just one of those elements and even the best high school team will fail.

What can you do to continue high school shooting? If you've been a rifle instructor, team coach, have an RSO card or know how to score targets, 15-20 kids will have a chance to learn and compete in the world's greatest sport.

CENTERFIRES OF THE OLD WEST

On the first Saturday this month five rugged (ragged?) rangers gathered under the supervision of Bob Gietz for a blackpowder cartridge rifle match at the Capitol range. Yes, that is somewhat beyond the scope of our traditional muzzleloaders but it is still very worthy of a good report.

Bob likes to call these matches the shooting of the Centerfires of the Old West and they really are fine rifles for good shooting. All of the shooters at this doin's fired Sharps Model 1874 style rifles except for Doug Simpson who used his H&R trapdoor carbine. And all shooters used .45-70 rifles except for Mike Nesbitt who used a .45-110 Sharps at 100 yards but then fell back to his .45-70 Sharps for the 50 yard target.

While Mike's big .45 might have been the loudest, it was not the highest scoring. The high scores for the day went to Kent Dunn and his .45-70. Kent was shooting and then reloading the empty cartridge case right there as we did our shooting. That's not hard to do.

Kent was the only shooter who scored into the 90s on both of his targets. But the highest score on a single target can be claimed by Mike with his 94XX which was shot from 50 yards. These cartridge rifles are well known for getting good scores at much longer ranges than what we shot but even so, you must do well at the closer targets before you can go for greater distances.

Bob DeLisle made a very good showing while shooting his .45-70 with its 32" barrel. This was the first time Bob has fired his rather new Sharps style rifle in a match but we can tell by the grin on his face that it won't be the last. And Doug Simpson was off to a fair start with his trapdoor but somehow the rear sight got loose and he quit on his 100 yard paper after just five shots.

It was just the other way around for Will Ulry. He started at 100 yards with a nice score. But between then and when he started to shoot at 50 yards his sight showed him that it has a mind of its own. What actually happened to his sight we don't know and we don't know where his shots went either. There might be a very tight 10-shot group somewhere out there. The shooting for score went rather quickly it was followed by some good discussion about loads, sights, and hunting. It certainly wasn't hard to find things to talk about and every rifle has its own story. Most of us would like to do this type of shoot again in Sept. so if you'd like to join us, please speak up.

In fact, if you have read this far maybe you'd be interested in starting a cartridge group for shooting matches, maybe some hunting, and some general sharing of good old cartridge technology. Like Will said just before he left, reloading blackpowder cartridges is a whole different world that stuffing bullets in the ol' '06. We could even have workshops where shooters could learn how to "roll their own" paper patched bullets as well as how to get them into the cartridge case without tearing the paper. There is more to making good blackpowder cartridge loads than that, of course. We could talk about lubes, powders and powder charges. Now, we probably won't be seeing a lot more cartridge doin's in this newsletter because it is for the Muzzleloaders. The point in saying that is just to remind you not to wait if you'd like to join us.





High Power Shooters

Well, I'm not sure where you guys all went – we only had 6 shooters show up Sunday for the M1 Garand Match. And it was a beautiful warm sunny day. We handed out CCR&P Distinguished Rifleman certificates to the 5 who have made it so far, except for Tony who was a no show.

This was a good match, with the winner being decided by X count! Although Gary Thorson won the match, Rod McDonald continues to wear the "target on his back" award, having won the Prone Slow, Prone Rapid, and Sitting Rapid stages. If it hadn't been for the one miss Rod had in Offhand (spooked by Bill's gun fire), Rod *could* have cleaned the match.

Since we had 4 shooters already qualified as Distinguished Riflemen, our two non-distinguished shooters had a good opportunity to get some points. Bill Englund got 6 distinguished points, and Dennis Coyle got another point. Persistence pays off....

Following the M1 match we had the Single Shot / Lever Action match – although this one was more of a "shoot anything you want free for all", with 20 rounds at a 50 yard bullseye. For a bonus, Fran set up milk cartons at 100 yards. Once you fired your 20 rounds for score, then you could try for a milk carton. Gary Baldwin, Gary Thorson, and Fran Huntington decided to go at it with .44 Magnum revolvers – representing Smith & Wesson, Colt, and Ruger. Of course, the Colt Anaconda won the revolver category.

July 2012 Oregon Trail Days

The Oregon Trail Days at Tenino were not quite as well attended as we had hoped but that didn't slow anything down at all. And the good MAIN AGGREGATE part to report was the very fine weather, warm but overcast which made some very good shooting light. Those who weren't there missed out! You get to see Steve in the winner's list more than once and he's a tough shooter to beat. And when you look at the individual matches that make up the aggregate, Matches 1 thru 6, you see that Adam was awarded in five of them. The aggregate matches and the top three aggregate winners were all awarded with WSMA medals. Smoothbores got to play a somewhat larger role this year when some of the shooters used their trade guns in the novelty matches held on Sunday. That was in addition to the T.G. match. The Trade Gun Match at Tenino is rather well known. For several years Harold Moore awarded all three places with buffalo powder horns. Lately I have offered a shooting pouch as one of the prizes for the Trade Gun Match and this year I was lucky enough to win my own pouch back. Actually there is too much to see and do at the Oregon Trail Days shoot to focus on any single event. A lot of shooting gets done in two days with a lot of winners and a lot of prizes. <u>MEMBERSHIP DUES RATES</u> Dues and Renewal policies are effective September 1, 2003

Members will receive a statement 45 days before their membership expires. (Your renewal month is found on your mailing label.) The dues renewal date is the last day of the month in which members' "annual date" falls. Members' gate card will automatically "lock out" on their renewal date if they have not renewed, and their membership will be considered "inactive" for 30-days, during which time they may still pay their dues. After 30-days on "inactive" status the membership will be terminated. Should they wish to rejoin CCR&P past the 30-days "inactive" status, they must reapply as a new member and attend the Orientation class. **Membership fees**, collected at the time of the orientation classes are:

Annual dues \$70.00 for the first member of each household and \$35.00 for each

additional eligible member of the household.

Initiation fee (one time) \$80.00 for each household and a refundable gate card deposit

fee of **\$10.00** for each member.

In addition, each member is expected to devote 8 hours of volunteer service annually

or recruit two new members or pay an assessment of \$80.00.
