Hey there high power shooters

The M1 Garand Matches started April 14th. We're hoping for a good turnout this season so we can keep this match going. Things will get underway around 9:00am so try to arrive 8:30ish or before to unload your gear and get settled in. Remember to mark your calendars for the 2nd Sunday of each month from now through September for the rest of the M1 Garand Matches...

New this year will be a Bolt Action Match as an auxiliary match to the M1 Garand Match. We will be running the Bolt Action Match concurrently with the M1 Garand Match. The Bolt Action Match will be shot at 100 yards using reduced targets. It'll be a 40 round match for score with the same position shooting as the M1 Garand and CMP Matches—except just 10 rounds prone slow verses the 20 rounds in the other matches for prone slow fire. The rapid fire stages (prone rapid and sitting rapid) will require the use of stripper clips, unless your bolt rifle happens to have a releasable magazine like an Enfield or the Swiss K-31, in which case you could use a second magazine or just one stripper clip. The match is geared toward iron sight old military rifles—essentially the "Old-Soldier" type, but if you're wish'n you could fire some old sporter conversion with a scope sitting in your closet—bring it. Your bragging rights just won't be the same as those of us using iron sights—

Also, Gary and I have discovered a lost stash of M2 Ball Ammo for our club M1 Garands. The club has 6 Garands available to use at no cost to the user. Maybe your brother, your son, or your neighbor might want to come shoot a Garand? You will of course have to purchase the necessary club ammo to use the Garands. The ammo—especially these days—is a bargain, just \$6 a box of 20 rounds. You will only be allowed to purchase enough ammo for each match you shoot in... If you drop out of the match you will have to sell back the ammo you haven't used in the match to the club at the same price you paid for it—it's only fair to everyone else... Please try to email or phone Gary or I to let us know in advance if you wish to borrow a club rifle. We'll have a couple with us, but if we need more we'll have to dig them out of the club vault.

Remember to bring a 2 round or two 5 round clips for your Garand to shoot the rapid fire stages. If you don't have these we will have a few extra to borrow. You'll of course have to have at least one normal 8 round clip as well.

One of my favorite things to hear is a line of Garands barking during the rapid fire stages followed by the remarkable "PING" of the clip dinging the ground after ejecting.

Hope you can make it, we look forward to seeing you. If you know anyone who might be interested, please pass this along...

And we had 3 first time shooters: William Murray proved that he will be a force to be reckoned with shooting a 440-6X; Timothy Malchert shot a very respectable 384-2X, and once Gary Baldwin shares his secret for keeping his glasses up with Dennis Walker (bungee cord from hat), Dennis will get his shots moved over a couple of inches and be right in the middle next time.

Match winner was Billy Clark, shooting an AR-15 for a score of 468-4X

- High score in prone slow fire was Fran Huntington with a 188-6X
- High score in prone rapid fire was William Murray with a 97-2X
- Gary Thorson and Fran Huntington tied for high score rapid sitting with 95-1X
- And high score standing slow fire was Billy Clark with a 93-1X outstanding shooting!

We also had 9 shooters stay for the .22LR Rapid Fire Silhouette Match. Timothy Malchert shot a match record time of **45 seconds** in his first string. Match winner was Rod McDonald with a combined time of 1 minute 48 seconds.

M1 Garand and Bolt Action Matches April 14, 2013

Given the crummy weather expectations for the weekend, we had 7 hardy shooters show up to kick-off the first M1 Match this season. As it turned out the weather was mostly cooperative—the wicked rain and hail seemed to only happen after we were safely under the cover of the firing line shed.

Rod McDonald proved once again he's hard to beat with an M1. He managed to edge out Gary Thorson by a score of 465-7x to Gary's 461-10x—good shooting guys. Joe Jauquent took the 3rdplace score with a 441-2x. Now that Joe's 'officially' sighted in his old M1, we've collective decided he's on his own figuring out his windage and come-ups from here on out for the rest of the season...J

We welcomed James Smith (JD) to our match today. He drove up from Aberdeen to shoot with us today. JD did real well for his first time on the line considering he had some sight malfunctions that cost his final score some points. Come on back JD, we also have an "Old Soldiers" match on Sunday, April 28th. You and your M1 will fit in nicely…plus it'll give you some time to get those sights adjusted and set for next month's M1 Match on May 12th.

This season we've added a Bolt Action Match to run concurrently with our M1 Garand Match. The bolt action match is shot at 100 yards using reduced targets. It follows the same position stages as the M1 Match with the only variation being 40 rounds verses the 50 for the M1 Match. We had four shooters today participate with Rod McDonald taking the match win. In order to win however, he had to use a scope on his incredibly sweat Model 70, while the rest of us used our 'iron' sights. It's interesting to note that even though Rod won the match, he didn't win any of the stages... Gary Thorson won both the Prone Slow Fire and Prone Rapid Fire stages, with Fran Huntington taking the Sitting Rapid Fire and Off-Hand Stages. Bill Stull shot most of the match with his cast bullet loads with great results. The overall scores were pretty darn good in this match and it seems to be well liked by the four of us who participated as well as the M1 Garand shooters who didn't bring a bolt gun today. (Several of those guys indicated they'll come prepared next month...look out Rod-)

Thanks to everyone who came out and we look forward to seeing next month. Remember the Old Soldiers Match on April 28th.

Beginner/Intermediate Handgun Match

April 13th was a true test of faith of how much you loved to shoot as the weather proved to be wet, a lot wetter, totally drenched, and cold. Those of us hardcore shooters (those that don't even seem to notice the weather) just used our water cooled guns with the 50 foot and deeper ammunition and it was a perfect day. Shooters should bring a hip holster and a center fire pistol – semi or revolver – of 9 mm or larger caliber, and at least 3 speed loaders or magazines. Four are better. Cross-draw and shoulder holsters are not allowed. We recommend that you bring at least 100 rounds to the match so that you have plenty of ammo for the match and any practice shooting you do. **Any shooters who do not have the needed equipment may borrow equipment from Larry or Ron but we ask that they reimburse us for the ammo they use.**

The 32 Boy Scouts from Troops 93, 300 and 327 of the Timberline District, Pacific Harbors Council of BSA were not only ready and prepared to participate for the event but two troops came a day early and camped overnight to be 'rarin' to go' at the day's start on Saturday morning. Spring Hunt, in the vernacular of the mountain men was the return to the beaver streams at the start of the year to harvest the heavier winter prime pelts for transport to the year's rendezvous. There was no beaver trapping this year but the Scouts did have the chance to compete in some of the traditional trappers' skills. The Puget Sound Free Trappers combined with the Capitol City Bowmen hosted the competition of the skills involved with Archery, Tomahawk Throwing and Muzzle Loading Rifle shooting. Attendance at Spring Hunt 2013 was comprised of ten scouts from Troop 93, 15 scouts from Troop 300 and seven boys from Troop 327.

Three groups of boys were organized to stage thru the separate events; The Washington State Muzzleloaders Association provided medals for the top three in each category as well as a grant for shooting components and prizes. Cabela's of Lacey, WA made a donation to the aggregate prizes and cast round balls for the shooting were donated by Kyle Sotelo. Event winners were: Aggregate 1st-Bradley Brown, Tr.300, 2nd-Noah Lorwin, Tr. 300, and 3rd-lan Simons, Tr. 300.

Archery winners were 1st-Simon Hovinghoff, Tr. 93, 2nd-Noah Lorwin, Tr 300, & 3rd-Bradley Brown, Tr. 300.

Tomahawk Throwing prizes went to; 1st-Bradley Brown, Tr 300, 2nd-Tyler Smith, Tr. 93, & 3rd-Ian Simons, Tr 300.

Rifle awards went to; 1st-Daniel Hoel, Tr. 300, 2nd-Nelson Nevis, Tr. 327, and 3rd-Sam Johnson Tr. 327.

WSMA Pilgrim awards for first time shooters at a black Powder event went to 14 of the Boy Scouts.

Each shooting group also received individual prizes for selection by each of the competitors.

Support and conduct of the event would not have been possible without the work of the Puget Sound Free Trappers and Capitol city Bowmen. Early birds on Friday afternoon ensured that targets and facilities were ready in ship shape. Key people responsible for the activities were Tom Witt, Black Powder Range Director for CCRP who coordinated Scout signup and scheduling and served as Range Master assisted by Craig Brown, Tim Sampson, CCRP Booshway for 2014 in charge of the Tomahawk Throw, and Bob Jamison headed up the Archery instruction and competition. Archery equipment came from the Washington State Archery Association National Archery in Schools program. Don Kerr, in full traditional attire, demonstrated flintlock rifle shooting for each shooting relay. Additional workers assisting for each range were Archery: Barbara Rheault and Dale Soost of the CCB assisted by Mike Nesbitt.

Tomahawk: Dave Perry, Frank Ponceroff, plus Bob & Julie Wright. The Free Trappers brigade manned the rifle range with Loaders: John Vladeff, Bo Brown, plus Nelson and Don Freelove. Line coaches were Kerry, Kyle and Ryan Sotelo, Allen Cunniff, Kent Dunn, Rowland Zoller, Doug Simpson, and Glenn Sutt. Rifles for the shooting competition were provided as the personal equipment of the Free Trappers involved.

MEMBERSHIP DUES RATES Dues and Renewal policies are effective September 1, 2003

Members will receive a statement 45 days before their membership expires. (Your renewal month is found on your mailing label.) The dues renewal date is the last day of the month in which members' "annual date" falls. Members' gate card will automatically "lock out" on their renewal date if they have not renewed, and their membership will be considered "inactive" for 30-days, during which time they may still pay their dues. After 30-days on "inactive" status the membership will be terminated. Should they wish to rejoin CCR&P past the 30-days "inactive" status, they must reapply as a new member and attend the Orientation class. **Membership fees**, collected at the time of the orientation classes are:

Annual dues \$70.00 for the first member of each household and \$35.00 for each

additional eligible member of the household.

Initiation fee (one time) \$80.00 for each household and a refundable gate card deposit

fee of \$10.00 for each member.

In addition, each member is expected to devote 8 hours of volunteer service annually

or recruit two new members or pay an assessment of \$80.00.

Non-immediate family member guests are limited to two visits annually.
