Bring on the May Flowers

The scouts and leaders at the 2015 Spring Hunt certainly had their share of the April Showers (with even ice pellets and hail thrown in!). This event, held on Saturday April 11th at Capital City Rifle and Pistol Club, near Littlerock WA showed local weather at its assorted best with even a few sun-breaks thrown in. The 27 Boy Scouts from Troops 93, 141, 300, 310, & 419 of the Timberline District, Pacific Harbors Council of BSA were not only ready and prepared to participate for the event but two troops came a day early and camped overnight to be 'rarin' to go' at the day's start on Saturday morning. Spring Hunt from the Rocky Mountain fur trade saw the return of the mountain men to the beaver streams at the start of the year to harvest the heavier winter pelts for transport to the year's rendezvous. There were no beaver to be trapped this year but the Scouts did have the chance to compete in some of the traditional trappers skills. The Puget Sound Free Trappers combined with the Capitol City Bowmen hosted the competition of the skills involved with Archery, Tomahawk Throwing and Muzzle loading Rifle shooting. Attendance at Spring Hunt 2015 was comprised of eight scouts from Troop 93, five scouts from Troop 300, four boys from Troop 310, one from Troop 141, and eight from Troop 419. The weather forecast discouraged a few of the less hardy.

Three groups of boys were organized to stage thru the separate events; The Washington State Muzzleloaders Association provided medals for the top three in each category as well as a grant for shooting components and prizes. Cabela's of Lacey WA made a donation to the aggregate prizes and cast round balls for the shooting were donated by Derek Sotelo.

WSMA Pilgrim awards for first time shooters at a Black Powder event went to fifteen of the Boy Scouts. Each shooting group also received individual prizes for selection by each of the competitors.

Support and conduct of the event would not have been possible without the work of the Puget Sound Free Trappers and Capitol City Bowmen. Early birds on Friday afternoon: Wayne and Cynthia Rankin, Don Kerr, Mike Nesbitt, Rowland Zoller Tony Yaklich, Frank Ponceroff, and Scott Isom ensured that targets and facilities were ready in ship shape.

Key people responsible for the activities were Tom Witt, Black Powder Range Director for CCRP who coordinated Scout signup and scheduling and served as Range Master, Tim Sampson, CCRP Booshway for 2014 in charge of the Tomahawk Throw and Bob Jamison headed up the Archery instruction and competition. Archery equipment came from the Washington State Archery Association National "Archery in Schools" program. Don Kerr, in full traditional attire demonstrated flintlock rifle shooting for each shooting relay. Additional workers assisting for Tomahawk: Scott Isom, Roy Williams, and Frank Ponceroff. The Free Trappers brigade manning the rifle range was Loaders: John Vladeff, Don Freelove, Nelson Freelove, Clarence Atchison, Doug Simpson and BO Brown and Line Coaches: Derek, Kerry and Kyle Sotelo, Rowland Zoller, Tom Brown, Will Ulry, Ralph Birmingham Tony and Ben Woore. Rifles for the shooting competition were provided as the personal equipment of the Free Trappers.

April 2015 Old West Centerfires

The third match of the 2015 Old West Centerfires season saw seven participants at the CCRP Black Powder Range. Weather was mild but cool and Tony's fire was very welcome along with the hot coffee. Six of the regulars were joined by a guest, Sam Snelson who was recruited and mentored by Allen Cunniff. The course of fire was total 20 rounds, 10 shots each at ranges of 50 and 100 yards. We used the double bullseye buffalo target at 50 yards and the 200 yard muzzleloading bullseye eye at 100 yards. Reliable Tony tended the coffee pot and assisted in posting shooters' scores. Targets will be 200 yd ML bullseye target at 100 yards for ten shots and the 200 Yard modified military bullseye out at 200 yards for another ten shots.

MEMBERSHIP DUES RATES

Dues and Renewal policies are effective September 1, 2003

Members will receive a statement 45 days before their membership expires. (Your renewal month is found on your mailing label.) The dues renewal date is the last day of the month in which members' "annual date" falls. Members' gate card will automatically "lock out" on their renewal date if they have not renewed, and their membership will be considered "inactive" for 30-days, during which time they may still pay their dues. After 30-days on "inactive" status the membership will be terminated. Should they wish to rejoin CCR&P past the 30-days "inactive" status, they must reapply as a new member and attend the Orientation class. **Membership fees**, collected at the time of the orientation classes are:

Annual dues **\$70.00** for the first member of each household and **\$35.00** for each additional eligible member of the household.

Initiation fee (one time) **\$80.00** for each household and a refundable gate card deposit fee of **\$10.00** for each member.

In addition, each member is expected to devote 8 hours of volunteer service annually or recruit two new members or pay an assessment of **\$80.00**.

(GUESTS: Members may bring their spouses and children under the age of 18 years old **as guests** as often as they'd like. Non-immediate family member guests are limited to two visits annually. Members **MUST** accompany their guests at all times, including spouses and children, and are responsible for the conduct of their guests.)

CCR&P and the Vermont Winter Postal League

This year, 7 shooters from CCR&P participated in the Vermont Winter Postal League for indoor 4 position rimfire target rifle shooting. Once again, to get enough shooters for a full team, we partnered up with former CCR&P shooter Tom Krugman and several of his buddies from the Modesto California Gun Club. Our team name was the "I-5's".

Out of 20 teams participating in the league, mostly from the northeast United States, the I-5's finished in 6th place.

The league ran for 10 matches, and to allow for a couple of absences we ran for 12 weeks to give everyone ample chance to get 10 scores. Our scores were emailed in to the league director in New York each week. For match number 10, we had to actually mail in our targets to be scored by the league director.

The course of fire was 10 shots slow fire in 10 minutes, in each of 4 positions: prone, sitting, kneeling, and standing, on the NRA A17 target at 50 feet. Total possible score for each match was 400. The 10 ring on this target is smaller than the diameter of a .22 bullet!

Each week, the top 4 scores from each team were recorded for the "team scores". In addition, individual scores were recorded throughout the league.

Out of a total of 81 shooters participating in the league, here are the results for your CCR&P shooters:

To give you an idea of how stiff the competition was, the 1st place shooter was a JUNIOR who won with a 397.3 average! If only we still had young eyes.

If you would like to participate in next year's league, we will start putting the team together in December. There is plenty of time to figure the game out. We shoot a 4-position "instructional league" every Wednesday night at 7:00 PM in the indoor range. Come on out and give it a try with your favorite .22 long rifle. It sure beats watching TV!
