Indoor Air Gun Matches at CCR&P Start in October

There are two types of indoor air rifle matches at CCR&P.

There is Air Rifle Benchrest which is shot from a bench rest at targets 50 feet away. The course of fire is four targets of 25 record shots. Time for each target is 20 minutes. Match is a total of 100 record shots plus any sighters. Shooters compete in two classes; Air rifles that are spring powered (SPR) or by compressed air [precharged pneumatic (PCP) which includes single stroke pneumatic (SSP)].

The other Air Rifle match is a Field Target match which is also shot indoors at 50 feet. The targets are similar to silhouette shooting but have a hole varying in size in which the shooter has to shoot through to trigger a lever the causes the silhouette to fall down. The match is 40 shots for score. The shooters shoot twice at 20 targets. There are two classes; Field Target which is shot from a sitting position and Hunter Field Target where the shooter can use support sticks/cross sticks and sit on a stool.

These events are designed to give air rifle shooters the opportunity to test both the accuracy of their equipment and their individual skills in a friendly, competitive atmosphere away from the outside weather conditions. These events are generally held once a month on Saturdays from October through March. Check the Club's calendar and come on out and give it a try. Capital City Rifle and Pistol Club **Board of Directors Meeting Minutes** September 4, 2015

The meeting was called to order at 7:00pm by Chris Moffet, President

The Flag Salute was led by Jeff Young.

Present at Roll Call: Chris Moffet, Doug Simpson, Will Ulry, John Mulhall, Ron Lohman, Jeff Young, Terry McManus, Larry Balestra, Bob Gietz, Bob Greenman, Bob Jamison, and Kent Dunn.

The Membership report was provided by John Mulhall and membership stands at 618.

The Treasurer's report was provided by Doug Simpson.

Old Business:

Bob Gietz provided a report on the Washington Historical Gunmakers Guild, noting that they have applied to use the facilities again in 2016 over the 1st weekend in May and the 3rd weekend in August. It was confirmed that the fee will remain at \$225.00 for each event but sales tax will be added to it

Bob Gietz reported that a Boy Scout troop held a work party last weekend and reworked the Blackpowder trail as part of an Eagle Scout project. He noted the Scouts found a number of dead alders - danger trees - in the BP trail area. This will be reported to Mike Jackson, the club's professional forester

Bob Greenman notified the board that the old tractor could disposed of by selling it. Larry Balestra made a motion to sell the tractor, John Mulhall seconded, and the vote was all ave.

New Business:

Jeff Young reported that member Mark Brown worked 57 hours of volunteer time on the club's facilities and has become the first member to receive a waiver of his following year's dues and assessment under a plan implemented by the board in 2014 to increase volunteers to help out with maintenance of the club's buildings and grounds. Thank you, Mark, for your work.

Jeff Young reported that the three youth shooting teams that have the club's sponsorship to use the facilities need financial support that is no longer coming from the usual sources. The biggest shortfall is ammunition (which I'm sure you all are aware of). They have found the best place to buy it is over the internet but the money comes out of the coaches pockets for the most part. The three teams are the Capital City Juniors, coached by John Crossman, the Black Hills High School rifle team, coached by Kent Dunn, and the Tumwater high School rifle team, coached by Bob Greenman. Each team will go through roughly 4 cases of .22 ammo each season. It was shown that there is no longer much difference in the price between match ammo and practice ammo. Equipment repairs and replacements have depleted each teams funds and the grants were not forthcoming this year. The board agreed to make 3 motions to provide funds in the amount of \$2400.00 per team for the teams to purchase the ammunition for this season. The coaches and club members who support them will make every effort to purchase in bulk to receive the best available pricing.

John Mulhall made the motion to fund the ammo for the Black Hills team. Larry Balestra seconded, the vote was all ave.

Will Ulry made the motion to fund the ammo for the Tumwater team, Larry Balestra seconded, the vote was all aye.

Larry Balestra made the motion to fund the ammo for the CCJRs team, John Mulhall seconded, the vote was all aye.

Bob Gietz introduced a discussion of the age for "Junior" shooters at events. He would specifically like the "break" age raised from 14 to 16 to match the NMLRA guidelines. The board determined that age breaks are determined by the match director and are match/range specific. Will Ulry donated 15 passes for the Hunter Sight-in to the Little Rock Fire Department in appreciation of their work during this rough fire season. Member Matt Cooper sent in a request for a hold on his dues and assessment for one year as he is being sent to Alabama for one year as part of his military service. This is granted. Matt is to notify the board when he departs and when he returns.

Former member Larry Schadt requested a waiver of consequences as he missed paying his dues in 2014 and was dropped from the membership after the 1 year deadline. The board agrees that Larry will have to start over again with the New Member Orientation, dues, and initiation fee. Chris Moffet reported that the club has missed qualification for the NRA Gold Medal Club status and this was the reason we did not receive the requested grant this year. He reviewed the 5 specific criteria to regain this status and it is as follows:

Have 100% NRA membership enrollment of the membership.

Have a club newsletter that communicates club activities and community issues as well as current events in the world of the NRA, Freedom and Second Amendment rights issues.

Belong to the NRA State Association of your state.

Incorporate or administer an NRA Youth Program.

Actively participate in NRA's Membership Recruiting Program

Some this we do and some of it is unclear whether what we do qualifies. Follow up with the NRA will assist us in determining what we are lacking in

Chris Moffet reported the NRA is holding a Range Development and Operations conference. The closest location will be in Kansas City, MO over the 3rd to the 6th of October. Topics covered will be Business Planning, Master Planning, EPA Lead Standards, Sound Abatement, Range Operations, Insurance, Ventilation, Outdoor and Indoor Range Construction, Range maintenance, Law Enforcement, and NRA Programs. After discussion, the board determined it would be to the club's advantage if a member could attend this conference and bring back a report and a bunch of information. It is felt that it would be proactive step for the club to be able to combat any potential opposition to the club's existence in the current world we live in. The board has agreed to cover the price of the conference \$475.00, the price of a reasonable airfare (approximately \$500-600.00), and the price of a reasonable hotel stay from October 2nd to October 7th (approximately \$600-900.00 depending on the location of the hotel and the vicinity of the conference), for a member willing to go to the conference. That member will be responsible for their meals, car rental (if desired), and all other costs. The member will be reimbursed for what the club will cover. A motion was made to do this by John Mulhall, second by Jeff Young, and the vote was all aye. I know this is short notice but if you can do this contact Chris Moffet ASAP. A motion to adjourn was made by Doug Simpson at 8:49pm, second by John Mulhall, and the vote was all aye.

MEMBERSHIP DUES RATES Dues and Renewal policies

Members will receive a statement 45 days before their membership expires. (Your renewal month is found on your mailing label.) The dues renewal date is the last day of the month in which members' "annual date" falls. Members' gate card will automatically "lock out" on their renewal date if they have not renewed, and their membership will be considered "inactive" for 30-days, during which time they may still pay their dues. After 30-days on "inactive" status the membership will be terminated. Should they wish to rejoin CCR&P past the 30-days "inactive" status, they must reapply as a new member and attend the Orientation class. **Membership fees (taxes are additional)**, collected at the time of the orientation classes are:

Annual dues \$70.00 for the first member of each household and \$35.00 for each

additional eligible member of the household.

Initiation fee (one time) \$80.00 for each household and a refundable gate card deposit

fee of \$10.00 for each member.

In addition, each member is expected to devote 8 hours of volunteer service annually

or recruit two new members or pay an assessment of \$80.00.

Washington: Ivory and Animal Products Ban to Be Voted On in the 2015 General Election

Anti-gun elitists in the Evergreen State are at it again! In the General Election on November 3, Initiative 1401, "The Washington Animal Trafficking Initiative" will go to the voters for approval. The Initiative's proponents are led by so-called animal "rights" groups and heavily funded by the co-founder of Microsoft, billionaire Paul Allen. Besides being misleading, I-1401 will punish law-abiding citizens who collect ordinary items, including antiques, artwork, jewelry, knives, firearms and accessories, furniture and many other lawfully owned and obtained items that contain ivory or any other "covered animal" part or products.Even worse, this proposed law contains no indication on how the prohibitions will curb illegal animal poaching and the trade in protected animal products outside of the United States.

Federal law contains extensive provisions regarding the import, possession and trade in endangered species, including animal parts. Regarding elephant ivory, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service has long presumed that most ivory in the U.S. was legally imported and that its sale in the U.S. would not increase poaching. Washington State law protects local wildlife, and already has a prohibition on the possession of any animal product from another country where the wildlife is known to have been illegally hunted or killed.

With few exceptions, this 16-page Initiative will ban legal transactions (sales, trades, rentals and more) if the transaction involves a product containing elephant ivory or any prohibited animal part– even if the item was legally crafted decades ago, was legally acquired, and has been legally possessed. In addition to excessive penalties, the enforcement mechanisms in the Initiative allow the government to seize and sell or donate valued personal property that contains the prohibited parts or products.

While it claims to stop the trafficking of animals threatened with extinction, Initiative 1401 will punish honest Washington citizens by making their lawful property worthless, and make "traffickers" out of those who attempt to buy or sell property containing any part of a "covered animal species."

On November 3, 2015, vote "NO" on Initiative 1401. Tell your family, friends, fellow sportsmen and sportswomen to do the same!

Our course of fire included a total of 20 rounds, 10 shots each at 50 and 100 yard distances. The 50 yard target was the double bullseye buffalo (5 rounds at each bullseye) and 100 yards we used the 100 yard Muzzle loading rifle target. The 100 yard target was used at 50 yards last year but we are at a point now that the 200 yard target which we had been using at 100 yards is too big.Dave Dolliver assisted in scoring.
