Event registrants amounted to 65 individuals and the shooters were composed of 44 men, 6 women, 5 juniors, and five under 12's. Eight campers endured in their tin-tepees and only 5 primitives took their damp canvas home to dry. Seven traders welcomed the patrons including a number of visitors from the local community.



The competitors had a range of typical events: Rifle, Trade Gun, Pistol, Knife & 'hawk and Archery trails. Roy Williams headed the shooting trails while Scott Isom ran the Knife & Hawk event and Clarence Atchison carried on as Trade Chief. Capable helpers were: Registrar/Clerk Tom Brown, Mike Nesbitt, Adam Sampson, Tim Sampson, BO Brown, Doug Simpson, Bob & Julie Wright, Jerry Mayo, and Dave Perry, along with perhaps some others whose names may have escaped, kept the trails working. Aggregate scores could combine either Archery or Knife &'hawk with the Rifle trail. The Capitol City Bowmen ran the Archery event while Will Ulry and youth parents were

overseers for the Under 12 events. Compliments certainly go to that fine staff.

Off the trail, in the shelter of the clubhouse, we had the Trader's Row. The kitchen was again being operated by the Capitol City Bowmen and the chow was really good. Our friends in the Washington State Muzzleloaders Association held their annual meeting late Saturday afternoon. On Saturday evening the clubhouse welcomed all comers to the Pot Luck, which had catered baked and fried chicken provided by the Free Trappers to compliment the tasty results of the Dutch oven competition.

Will Ulry was in charge of the evenings' events. Our Trader's Auction filled out the evening's agenda followed by the Poker tournament. Lots of folks pitched in to get the "dirty details" taken care of which included some of the "guests" as well as the hard-working Free Trappers. Dutch oven cooking competition had two parts; main dishes and desserts. Top awards went to Mike Moran for the main dish and JoJo McWhinney for the dessert.

MEMBERSHIP DUES RATES Dues and Renewal policies

Members will receive a statement 45 days before their membership expires. (Your renewal month is found on your mailing label.) The dues renewal date is the last day of the month in which members' "annual date" falls. Members' gate card will automatically "lock out" on their renewal date if they have not renewed, and their membership will be considered "inactive" for 30-days, during which time they may still pay their dues. After 30-days on "inactive" status the membership will be terminated. Should they wish to rejoin CCR&P past the 30-days "inactive" status, they must reapply as a new member and attend the Orientation class. **Membership fees (taxes are additional)**, collected at the time of the orientation classes are:

Annual dues \$70.00 for the first member of each household and \$35.00 for each

additional eligible member of the household.

Initiation fee (one time) \$80.00 for each household and a refundable gate card deposit

fee of \$10.00 for each member.

In addition, each member is expected to devote 8 hours of volunteer service annually

or recruit two new members or pay an assessment of \$80.00.

This match saw shooting with rifles, pistols, and trade guns. Our course of fire had a variety of critter targets to challenge test the shooters' skills. After a brief shooters' meeting, 2018 Rain-de-voo Booshway Clarence Atchison was acknowledged and congratulated for stepping up to the position. He also shot very well particularly considering his badly twisted arm. Will Ulry reminded us of a work party being held on March 15th to replace the black powder range gate, starting about 9am. Then good shooting proceeded with target scoring assistance from Mike Nesbitt and Jerry Mayo.

The luck targets for the day: Mike Fink target was won by Jerry Mayo and the single mystery card was won by Clarence Atchison. Individual event skills placements went to: (Trade Gun) 1st-Mike Nesbitt, 2nd - Don Kerr, and 3rd - Will Ulry; (Rifle) 1st-Mike Nesbitt, 2nd-Clarence Atchison, and 3rd-Will Ulry. (Tied scores for 1st and 2nd were broken by Mike having 2 "x's."); (Pistol) 1st-Mike Nesbitt, 2nd- Clarence Atchison and 3rd-Don Kerr. Aggregate placings were; 1st-Mike Nesbitt, 2nd-Clarence Atchison and 3rd-Don Kerr. Old West Centerfires Match Report February 2017 Frosty Finger Bones for February

We had ten shooters turn out for this first-of-the-year event. Actually, this was the second match of the 2017 season but our first match was fired late last year. Of today's shooters, one was a real novice coming to his first ever Centerfire range match. That was Phil Wiebe and we certainly expect to be seeing him, and his Sharps, again. Additionally, the weather treated us rather kindly because nothing was falling from the sky and the light was pretty good for shooting.

As with every match, we always need one shooter to finish at the bottom of the list and this time it was our new shooter, Phil Wiebe shooting a C. Sharps Arms Model 1875 in .45/70 caliber. Phil surely should get the "persistence award" as he had an untested rifle starting with bore sighting to even get on the paper.

Allen Cunniff needs some special recognition for working with Phil to get him acclimated to the range and shooting format, Phil also needs to get just a bit more used to shooting over X-sticks. But that will come, probably very soon.

Our top shooter was Mike Nesbitt using his favorite C. Sharps Arms rifle in .44/77. Mike did his shooting with the standard blade front sight, using 405 grain bullets cast from a mold from Accurate Molds. The right bullseye on his 50 yard target was very nice, something to try to do over again...

Mike finished just three points ahead of the next tied pair of shooters. Jeff Ritter took second with his original Remington Rolling block in .45-90 by virtue of a higher score at 100 yards, breaking the tie with Bob DeLisle (shooting a Pedersoli Sharps in .45/70). Both shooters had scores of 180-2X. And just one point behind them in fourth place was Don Kerr shooting his C. Sharps Arms '74 Hartford target model chambered in .45/90. Then, just three points behind Don came Jerry Mayo shooting his way into fifth place with his 1874 C. Sharps Arms Hartford in .45/70. This was a rather tight match.

Right behind Jerry came Wayne Miller shooting for score with his hereditary .38/55 Winchester special order Highwall. We talked about that rifle in the report of our last Old West Centerfires match but this time Wayne completed with it whereas last time he watched. That gun is a real eyeful and we can expect we'll be seeing it on our firing line again. For Wayne this was the first match or competition for him and that nice rifle.

Seventh place was claimed by Allen Cunniff and he, being one of our very best shooters, is somewhat unaccustomed to placing this far from the top. Allen was shooting his rather new .50/70 by C. Sharps Arms and he was shooting it with the standard, barrel mounted, open sights. (I believe Allen is the first to enter one or our matches while using a rifle with open sights.) That rifle is the gun Allen considers his hunting rifle and he was shooting with paper patch bullets. While his targets didn't place as high as he usually scores, he was really quite pleased with his rifle's performance.

In eighth place was Jim Dickerman with his Pedersoli .45/70 and we usually see him finish with a much higher match total. We usually see him shooting his Shiloh too. For some reason the 100 yard target in this match got the best of Jim but his 50 yard target was in good shape. And in at 9th place was Will Ulry shooting a Shiloh Sharps in .45/70. That brings us to Phil Wiebe again, where we began this report.

Our second match for this season was a very good one and getting 10 shooters on our firing line was just something to help make it so good. We've got four more matches before completing this season and we have aggregate prizes for our shooters. That's why you'll see an accumulative score shown in addition to the scores from this match. The next Old West Centerfires match, to be shot at 100 & 200 yards, will be in April on the High Powder Range. Try to join us.
