The range board at top of hill needs a sign indicating the Multipurpose Range is closed. Bob G. will talk to Black Powder contact person about a sign. Discussion about all ranges having this problem.

- Doug S. gave Treasurer's report. Question arose about last year's Friends of the NRA donation CCRP made.

CCR&P High Power Rifle 2016 Season Championships

Each year, CCR&P holds 18 high power rifle matches. Of these, there are 6 NRA/CMP format Service Rifle Matches, 6 Old Soldiers Matches, and 6 M1 Garand Matches. For the past few years, we have been awarding Season Championship medals to the shooters who have completed at least 5 out of 6 matches in each match category. The top 3 Season Champions for each match get their names engraved on a trophy which resides in the Clubhouse.

Additionally, a few years ago we started the CCR&P Distinguished Rifleman awards. They way that works is that any shooter who "places" in any high power rifle match is awarded points. The number of points available in any match is based on the number of shooters who participate in the match. For example, if there are 10 or more shooters in a match, we will give "placing" awards to the top 5 shooters, and they will earn points toward CCR&P Distinguished Rifleman. Those who earn 20 points in a calendar year receive the CCR&P Distinguished Rifleman award for the year.

MEMBERSHIP DUES RATES Dues and Renewal policies

Members will receive a statement 45 days before their membership expires. (Your renewal month is found on your mailing label.) The dues renewal date is the last day of the month in which members' "annual date" falls. Members' gate card will automatically "lock out" on their renewal date if they have not renewed, and their membership will be considered "inactive" for 30-days, during which time they may still pay their dues. After 30-days on "inactive" status the membership will be terminated. Should they wish to rejoin CCR&P past the 30-days "inactive" status, they must reapply as a new member and attend the Orientation class. Membership fees (taxes are additional), collected at the time of the orientation classes are:

Annual dues \$70.00 for the first member of each household and \$35.00 for each

additional eligible member of the household.

Initiation fee (one time) \$80.00 for each household and a refundable gate card deposit

fee of \$10.00 for each member.

In addition, each member is expected to devote 8 hours of volunteer service annually

or recruit two new members or pay an assessment of \$80.00.

April 2017 Old West Centerfires Match Report

No Showers today.

We had nine shooters turn out for this spring-of-the-year event. Additionally, the weather treated us rather kindly by omitting the forecast rain and even having occasional calm periods where the smoke obscured sighting and spotting vision momentarily. Coffee was available with moderate demand and we give thanks to Dave Dolliver for compiling the scores.

One rifle that deserves to be commented on again: Wayne Miller returned with his original Winchester Highwall in .38/55, complete with an interesting story. That rifle had been his father's but Dad sold the gun several years ago. It was after Wayne's father had passed on that Wayne located the rifle again and made sure it came home to his own gun rack. This .38/55 Highwall has some special order features such as the 34" light and long #2 barrel and the double set triggers. Wayne had practiced before but this was the second match competition for him and it.

Our top shooter was Mike Nesbitt using his C. Sharps Arms rifle in .44-90, the big thunder in the range for today. He finished just one point ahead of Bob DeLisle, the next best. Bob had the best single score of the day with a 95-2X at the 200 yard range, while Mike was nicknamed "Mr. Consistency" for shooting a pair of 94's with 2X at 100 yards and 1X at 200 yards for a total of 188-3X. Jeff (Blue Jacket) Ritter took third place with his Shiloh Sharps in .45/70. Fourth place went to Jerry Mayo with his C. Sharps Arms '74 in .45-70. Fifth place went to Allen Cunniff who shot a witnessed set of targets in advance with his C. Sharps Arms 1874 in .45-70. Sixth place was taken by Don Kerr shooting his C. Sharps Arms '74 Hartford target model in .45/90. Right behind him came Wayne Miller shooting for competition with his hereditary .38-55 Highwall. Eighth place was won by Will Ulry with his Shiloh Sharps in .45-70. Ninth place was taken by Phil Wiebe who was joining the buffalo shooters for the second time with his C. Sharps Arms Model 1875 in .45-70.

In the shooters meeting preceding the event, coming range developments were discussed with the optimistic construction schedule for a new shooting facility to be completed before our next OWC match which will be held on the first weekend in June. Our optimism includes an expeditious Thurston County permit approval. The contactor has been given notice to proceed awaiting only the permit completion to begin work. Also a modified course of fire was discussed with an optional 5-shot target for the 50 yard range to be shot offhand. This may have a trial run for experience with adoption only after the current series s completed in September to maintain integrity of the cumulative scores. We have had a three very good matches for 2017 and if this is any indication, we'll have a very good year with our Old West Centerfires matches. The next OWC match, to be shot at 100 & 200 yards again, will be in June on the High Power Range

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Scouts Meet the Weather at Spring Hunt 2017

The Boy Scouts and their leaders attending the 2017 Spring Hunt (Puget Sound Free Trappers' doin's) certainly had their share of April's varied weather. Alternating rainy skies with gusty winds and sun breaks. This doin's was held on Saturday, April 8th, at the Capital City Rifle and Pistol Club, near Littlerock, WA and it was blessed with local weather at its assorted best, even had a few sun-breaks thrown in.



The 36 Boy Scouts from Troops 93 (Morton), 300, 319, 9419 (Chehalis-Centralia) and 9310 (Rochester) of the Timberline District, Pacific Harbors Council of BSA were not only ready and prepared to participate for the event but one troop came a day early and camped overnight to be 'rarin' to go' at the day's start on Saturday morning. Spring Hunts during the Rocky Mountain Fur Trade saw the return of the mountain men to the beaver streams early in the year, just after ice break-up, to harvest the heavier prime pelts to be taken to the summer rendezvous. There were no prime beaver to be trapped at this doin's but the Boy Scouts did have the chance to compete in some of the traditional trappers' skills. The Puget Sound Free Trappers, combined with the Capitol City Bowmen, hosted the competition of the skills involved with Archery, Tomahawk Throwing and Muzzle-Loading Rifle shooting. Attendance at Spring Hunt 2016 was comprised of five scouts from Troop 93, 15 scouts from Troop 300, four boys from Troop 319, four from Troop 9310, and eight more from Troop 9419.

Three groups of boys were organized into stages through the separate events, basically the boys were split into thirds so each of the "events" were going on all at the same time. The Washington State Muzzleloaders Association provided medals for the top three in each category as well as a grant for shooting components and prizes. The cast round balls were donated by "Loco Jeff" Ritter and Sunbirds in Chehalis provided a generous donation of prizes.

WSMA Pilgrim medals were awarded to the first-time shooters at a Black Powder event went to thirteen of the Boy Scouts. Each shooting group also received individual prizes "off of the blanket" and selected by each of the competitors

Support and conduct of the event would not have been possible without the work of the Puget Sound Free Trappers and Capitol City Bowmen. Early birds on Friday afternoon: Will Ulry, Tim Sampson, Dave Perry, Clarence Atchison, Frank Ponceroff, and Scott Isom ensured that targets and facilities were ready in ship shape.

Key people responsible for the activities were Tom Witt, Black Powder Range Director for CCRP who coordinated Scout signup and scheduling and served as Range Master, Tim Sampson, in charge of the Tomahawk Throw, and Sherrie headed up the Archery instruction and competition. Archery equipment came from the Washington State Archery Association National "Archery in Schools" program. Don Kerr, in full traditional attire, demonstrated flintlock rifle shooting for each shooting relay. Additional workers assisting for Tomahawk; Dave Perry and Clarence Atchison. The Free Trappers brigade manning the rifle range was: Loaders; John Vladeff, Don Freelove, BO Brown, and Doug Simpson, and the Line Coaches were; Derek Sotelo, Rowland Zoller, Frank Ponceroff, Tom Brown, Ralph Birmingham, Will Ulry, and Tony Woore. Rifles were provided as the personal equipment of the Free Trappers.

The staff of Free Trappers and the Bowmen deserve a tremendous thank you for the generosity of their time required to put on this day-long event. Also, the WSMA receives our thank you for the medals and the youth grant which provided prizes and awards and grateful appreciation to Sunbirds for prize donation. We look forward to putting this Spring Hunt on again next year.

Hello High Power Rifle Shooters,

On a very rainy 4th Sunday of March we had 10 shooters on the line for the NRA/CMP format Service Rifle Match. Fortunately, the targets stayed mostly dry in the rain and there was no wind to blow them off the back boards.

The Service Rifle match is a 4 stage match consisting of 20 rounds slow fire from the prone position in 20 minutes, 10 rounds rapid fire prone in 70 seconds, 10 rounds rapid fire sitting in 60 seconds, and 10 rounds slow fire standing in 10 minutes. All stages are shot at 200 yards, with a maximum of 500 points. The "Service Rifles" are mostly AR-15's, with some M1A's and M1 Garands - generally, they are standard issue U.S. military rifles.

After an extended absence, and after a while getting back into the swing of things, Rick Baldwin was today's match winner shooting an AR-15 for a score of 478-8X. Congratulations, Rick! 2nd place went to Tom Schuettke shooting 459-6X with an AR-15. And 3rd place was Gary Thorson with 447-4X from an AR-15.

Following the Service Rifle Match, we had our regular "So You Think You're A Sniper, Huh?" challenge match. The challenge consists of 3 prone shots at a 6-inch gong at 200 yards, and 1 kneeling and 1 standing shot at an 8-inch gong at 100 yards, for a total of 5 shots. Shots are taken one at a time down the line, and the shooter with the most hits on the gongs wins. Gary Baldwin and Gary Thorson finished the 5 shots tied with 5 hits each. So they went into a Sudden Death shoot off. The tie-breaker shot was a "supported standing" shot, where you could brace yourself on the line shed post, at the 6-inch gong at 200 yards. Gary Baldwin missed, and Gary Thorson hit to win the challenge.

Next was the Carbine match. This is a fun match, consisting of two 20-round strings for a total of 40 rounds. Shooters load two 10-round magazines. At the "fire" command, take 5 shots standing, then take a knee and take 5 shots kneeling, then go to prone position, reload, and take 10 shots - all in a time limit of 1 minute. We used the "5-V" targets at 50 yards. Hits in the black bulls eye were 1 point, and hits in the white were 0. The Carbine Match win went to Gary Thorson with 36 hits out of 40 in the black.
