November 2017 Muzzle Loading Match Report

Match day, Saturday, November fourth found overcast skies and a forecast of coming winter's chill. Twelve well-dressed Free Trappers for this start of the range season event came with their rifles and pistols. Range preparation had been done the preceding day and a vote of real appreciation is due to Bob DeLisle, Allen Cunniff, and Clarence Atchison for their efficient and timely assistance. Our course of fire was amended by eliminating the Trade Gun Match to "shorten our morning" so our shooters could easily attend the Memorial Services early in the afternoon for Pete Strobl at the Evergreen Sportsmen's club. A safety meeting was held near the good stove and hot coffee was combined with minimal discussion in view of the schedule. Mike Nesbitt gave information on firing a salute with our muzzleloaders which was the "kick-off" for Pete's Celebration of Life. Then the good shooting proceeded with the accustomed order of fire for rifles, pistols, tie breakers and luck targets. Among the familiar faces were "J.C" (Jerry Charlton) and Jeffrey Ritter.

Despite the cold weather (a damp 38 degrees), shooting progressed in an expeditious and orderly manner with needed recourse to the warming stove and coffee pot. The turkey head on the pop can was won by Clarence Atchison. The single shot fired at the deer target match was set up for winner to be determined from those with full body shots, with the winner selected by the best shot on the tiebreaker. Three targets emerged to be evaluated, however Roy Williams had neglected to fire his tie breaker and thus was eliminated. The remaining two: Jerry Charlton and Will Ulry had identical tie breakers and they split the pot. Individual and aggregate prizes were provided by the Club in the form of turkey oriented meat prizes. Rifle and Pistol match prizes went to: Pistol; 1st - Frank Ponceroff, 2nd - Clarence Atchison, and 3rd - Mike Nesbitt, Rifle; 1st - Clarence Atchison, 2nd - Bob DeLisle and, 3rd - Jerry Mayo. Aggregate placings were; 1st - Clarence Atchison, 2nd - Bob DeLisle, 3rd - Mike Nesbitt, 4th - Will Ulry, 5th - Tom Witt, 6th - Jerry Charlton, 7th - Dewayne Pritchett, 8th - Jeffrey Ritter, 9th - Jerry Mayo, 10th - Roy Williams, 11th - Frank Ponceroff, and 12th - Jeff Ritter.

The shooters then adjourned to go to the memorial service at Evergreen Sportsmen's Club where a 13 gun (at least) volley salute was fired by the group at the beginning of Pete Strobl's services. Coming events are the monthly Evergreen Shoot next Saturday at 0930. The Old West Centerfires match will be held on Saturday, November 18th, probably on the High Power Range since no construction is evident at this time. The next Puget Sound Free Trappers shoot will be Saturday, December 2nd with set up being done on the preceding day at 2 PM.

"Girl of the West" By Jeff Young

She rides horses, loves the wide open spaces and uses her trusty rifle to shoot turkeys, prairie chickens and mountain goats. If novelist Zane Grey was writing her story, she'd be called "Girl of the West."

Times have changed since western women braved gunslingers and cattle drives, but their legacy lives on in girls like 16 year old Jessica Boos: Young women who saddle their own horses, dream of working stock in Montana and develop rifle skills that would dazzle shooters of yesteryear.

Jessica began shooting bb guns before she was five and grew up travelling to silhouette matches with her father and watching her mom shoot pistol.

Already on a first-name basis with many of the top silhouette shooters in the

country, she decided that shooting with this "extended family" was the challenging but supportive niche she belonged in.

Like other teenage shooters, she needed practice and muscle to master the heavy guns with their sophisticated sights and hair triggers.

"I started out with one of dad's rifles. I struggled for a while shooting left-handed with a right-side bolt. And in order for me to see, my dad had to mount the scope so low that it almost touched the barrel." Later she got a left handed CZ that she continues to use.

"We've switched some things as I grew older," said Jessica. "I now have a fairly normal height scope and we added barrel length and weight as my arms got longer."

One thing that hasn't changed is her distinctive "zombie green" stock. They must work since I can't think of a single green rifle shooter who's encountered any of these noisy monsters.

The real ogres at silhouette matches are small and distant targets. The scoring system is unforgiving. There is no *almost*. You either knock the metal animal off its pedestal or you don't.

Like other disciplines, silhouette takes time and continuous learning, whether you hit one target or all 40. It also requires a sort of a psychological balancing act.

"We have to learn the balance between trying too hard and not trying enough. When you let your subconscious work, it becomes easier. It almost feels like someone else is operating the rifle and you get to watch the targets fall."

"What keeps me and many others in shooting is hoping for moments like that when everything comes together and it feels like you can't miss."

Experience and concentration teach us what causes hits and misses. According to Jessica, "The biggest challenge I've faced is getting out of my own way. Most of the time I miss a target is because I over-think the shot, instead of just letting it happen.

"It's also hard for me to accept a miss and not let that affect the rest of my shots. Shooting requires a no-quit mentality and a lot of mental resilience. It would be so easy to just give up when you make a bad shot. You have to learn how to move on and restart on the next one."



For many young shooters, the concentration required for shooting also pays off in the classroom and with other activities.


"It's helped me immensely, "says Jessica. "When I compete in equestrian events, I'm able to focus on what I need to do and nothing else. I have teammates who get emotional and forgetful, which prevents them from competing at the best of their ability."

"Shooting has also given me a good work ethic, the ability to look beyond the immediate result and to see how my actions now will affect my future."

Although some may consider silhouette a maledominated sport, an increasing number of women are joining the firing line – and winning, especially at the larger matches.

Cathy Winstead-Severin is the sport's superstar, winning gold medals for Olympic Running Boar, U.S. and Canadian silhouette championships, and amassing a string of record-setting scores.

Motivation from her family – and extended shooting family – has paid off. Jessica



As for her future, most of next horizons lie to the east. She plans to attend WSU and hopefully its veterinary school. She sees a future as a large animal vet somewhere in the mountains and prairies of Idaho, Montana or Wyoming.

There are studies and chores, but whenever possible she rides horses and shoots rifles. You're not likely to see her with a Stetson – let alone a bonnet. But as though born in an earlier time, she is through and through "A Girl of the West."

- The definition of "Service Rifle U.S. Rifle, Caliber 5.56 mm M16 series" has been updated to reflect the recent CMP & NRA rule changes to allow scopes, quad rails, and adjustable butt stocks on AR-15's for the CMP Match
- Beginning in January, the Old Soldier Match will be in the months of Jan, Feb, Mar, and Oct, Nov, Dec. (mainly because there is less walking in the rain to the 200 yard line)
- The CMP Matches will be in the months of Apr, May, Jun, Jul, Aug, and Sep.(mainly because there is more walking in the sunshine)
- · Following the M1 Garand Match, we will have a Bolt Action Rifle "fun" match. Check out the course of fire.

Remember, you can shoot "Any Rifle" you want in any of our matches. You just won't qualify for medals and awards if you bring your blunderbuss to the CMP Match. So, bring whatever you have and come shoot with us. Gary

MEMBERSHIP DUES RATES Dues and Renewal policies

Members will receive a statement 45 days before their membership expires. (Your renewal month is found on your mailing label.) The dues renewal date is the last day of the month in which members' "annual date" falls. Members' gate card will automatically "lock out" on their renewal date if they have not renewed, and their membership will be considered "inactive" for 30-days, during which time they may still pay their dues. After 30-days on "inactive" status the membership will be terminated. Should they wish to rejoin CCR&P past the 30-days "inactive" status, they must reapply as a new member and attend the Orientation class. Membership fees (taxes are additional), collected at the time of the orientation classes are:

Annual dues \$70.00 for the first member of each household and \$35.00 for each

additional eligible member of the household.

Initiation fee (one time) \$80.00 for each household and a refundable gate card deposit

fee of \$10.00 for each member.

In addition, each member is expected to devote 8 hours of volunteer service annually

or recruit two new members or pay an assessment of \$80.00.
