THE ANNUAL .50/70 MATCH



Eleven shooters dusted off their big bores and manned the shooting line on the High Power Range for the 3RD Annual .50/70 Match in February, sponsored by the Black River Buffalo Runners. As a departure from our Old West Centerfire competitions, this match required participants to bring their various and sundry .50 caliber buffalo rifles to shoot the 20-shot course at 100 and 200 yards. The weather was very nice and no extraordinary measures were needed to ensure shooter survival. Dan Johnson supervised the crowd as RSO. Not attending were regulars Tom Brown and Bob Gietz, but we hope to see them again soon. In addition to the shooters, we had a few welcome observers who we feel confident will join the line in future events. In any regard, visitors are always welcome.

Curt Lokovsek and Ken Kurfurst showed up just to observe. With a little arm twisting and threats involving compromising photos, Curt was convinced to share Loco Jeff Ritter's Remington rolling block and become a last-minute participant, taking fourth place with the 2nd high score at 100 yards. Loco Jeff, who took fifth, says Curt can no longer borrow his rifle. Ken deferred in borrowing equipment, but I anticipate that the ride home may have whetted his desire and we expect him to be back in his shooting role soon. Curt will go home a richer man after gaining possession of a set of shooting sticks donated by our good (and missed) friend Don Kerr. Tom Herman was also back, after an extended hiatus between shoots. Welcome back, Tom!

Scores in this match were, as expected, reflective of shooters setting aside their favorite target rifles and picking up the standby .50-caliber, some for the first time in a good while. It's always a learning experience. Jerry Mayo was firing his newly rebuilt rolling block for its second match. Bob DeLisle began his 200-yard string with his first 3 shots off the paper high, his fourth shot clipping the paper, then followed with 5 of his next 6 shots in a tight cluster in the 10 and X rings. That was a nice recovery indeed. Bob is the resident shooter with the most paper patch experience and once again he used his paper patch loads in this event.

In the .50/70 match, 10 shooters fully participated, with the 11th, Wes Davis, forming a one-man Class B with his .45/70. He, predictably, took first place in that class. I can proudly say I had the high score on both 100-yard and 200-yard targets with scores of 88 and 95-X respectively for a match-winning total of 183-1X. That was with my C. Sharps Arms .50/70 with a paper patched loads, using 69 grains of 2f Swiss black powder under a 555-grain bullet cast in an Accurate mold. Mike Nesbitt took 2nd place with consistent scores of 82-3X at 100 yards and 86-X at 200. Mike also used his C. Sharps Model '74, with the 26" barrel. In third place, close behind Mike, was Tom Witt shooting with a heavy Sharps rifle borrowed from Mike and getting a total score of 165 while shooting the second-highest score of the day at 200 yards.

Ten shooters showed up to enjoy a mostly sunny day for our monthly muzzle loading match. The focus of this month's match was for Squirrel Rifles and for our purposes those were rifles of .40 caliber or smaller. Tom Witt brought out his .32 caliber rifle which could be considered a true squirrel rifle but if we made that known it would just go to his head. The course of fire consisted of two paper targets at 25 yards, one paper target at 50 yards for five shots each and then five gongs; two at 25 yards, one at 50 and two more at 75 yards respectively for one shot each. Mind you now, our heavy steel gongs are not very reactive to these small caliber rifles shooting round balls so spotters were engaged to detect the slightest movement at the longer range targets. Those targets and gongs made this a 20-shot match plus one more shot for the tiebreaker.

An added bonus was the one-shot luck target which was a 6-inch "X" posted at 25 yards that was won by Steve An-

drews with an almost dead center shot, what we call a pinwheel.

Match results are as follows; Bob DeLisle-1st, Mike Nesbitt-2nd, Josh Brown-3rd, Tom Witt-4th, Steve Andrews-5th, Clarence Atchison-6th, Will Ulry-7th, Ralph Burmingham-8th, and Frank Ponceroff-9th. Jerry Mayo took 1st place in his separate category, which was for rifles larger than .40 caliber. (We did recognize that not all of our shooters have muzzleloading rifles that are .40 or under.)

Many thanks to Dan Johnson who came out to help keep an eye on things as RSO and he also served as a spotter for some of the longer gong shots. Also, thanks to those who helped with setup and teardown of the range.

Next month will be a Tradegun only match with both stationary and flying targets. Come on out and watch the fun but if you do be forewarned, it is addictive.

February Old Soldier Match

On Sunday, Feb. 28, we held our first Old Soldier Match of the new year, with 5 shooters participating in the match. Previous Old Soldier Matches were 30 rounds all slow fire in the prone position. This was the first Old Soldier Match under our new format where we introduced a Rapid Fire Prone stage, a Rapid Fire Sitting stage, and a Slow Fire Standing stage. Most of the shooters used a vintage military bolt action rifle. We set the time limit at 90 seconds for the rapid fire stages. We start with a loaded 5 shot magazine and an open bolt. At the fire command, you close the bolt to chamber a round and shoot your first five shots. Then reload the rifle and fire the second five shots. Stripper clips really help with the reloads. Barring any malfunctions, all the shooters were able to complete the string of fire within the allotted 90 seconds. The entire match was shot on the standard 200 yard military target. The new format proved to be a lot of fun. Here are the scores:

MEMBERSHIP DUES RATES Dues and Renewal policies

Members will receive a statement 45 days before their membership expires. (Your renewal month is found on your mailing label.) The dues renewal date is the last day of the month in which members' "annual date" falls. Members' gate card will automatically "lock out" on their renewal date if they have not renewed, and their membership will be considered "inactive" for 30-days, during which time they may still pay their dues. After 30-days on "inactive" status the membership will be terminated. Should they wish to rejoin CCR&P past the 30-days "inactive" status, they must reapply as a new member and attend the Orientation class. Membership fees (taxes are additional), collected at the time of the orientation classes are:

Annual dues \$70.00 for the first member of each household and \$35.00 for each

additional eligible member of the household.

Initiation fee (one time) \$80.00 for each household and a refundable gate card deposit

fee of \$10.00 for each member.

In addition, each member is expected to devote 8 hours of volunteer service annually

or recruit two new members or pay an assessment of \$80.00.

Non-immediate family member guests are limited to two visits annually. Members **MUST** accompany their guests at all times, including spouses and children, and are responsible for the conduct of their guests.)
