BLACK POWDER LEVER GUN MATCH

After this brand-new type of shooting match (new to us, at least) was announced last month, we had our first Black Powder Lever Gun Match, held on the Black Powder Range. This gathering was not a big one, just eight shooters came to test their skills, but all eight were very enthusiastic about the match and their shooting.

Tom Brown became the match manager in Tom Witt's absence. Tom Witt might have had some special targets in mind for this match but Tom Brown had to carry on without any such knowledge. So, Tom Brown quickly picked out some targets that were very good. Those targets included the 6-bullseye target for offhand shooting at 25 yards, with two shots at each of the scoring bullseyes, and the double bullseye buffalo

target for use at 50 yards. The double bullseye target was to received 10 shots at each bullseye, or twenty shots. Ten of those shots, at the bullseye of the shooter's choice, were shot while sitting behind cross-sticks and the other bullseye, for the other 10 shots, were fired from the off-hand position. In addition to those 30 shots, seven more shots were fired at the gongs from 50 to 100 yards, making the rifle match a full 37 rounds.

Then for more, a 10-shot revolver match was also held using small targets posted on the 25-yard and allowing the "firing line" to advance to about 10 yards from the targets.

Because this was a different type of shooting for the black powder range, done with repeating rifles, we had some interesting points introduced at our shooters' meeting. One of those points was that we could load the rifles' magazines while the match was being fired. If, for any reason, a cease-fire was called, such as if a deer wandered out onto the range, the rifles with car-

tridges in the magazines were to be stood in the rifle rack behind the firing line with their actions opened. That assured there would be no cartridges in the rifles' chambers and they could not be fired. Once the range was opened again, the rifles were to be returned to the firing line where shooting would resume. No cease-fire was needed and some of the shooters did load their gun's magazines while other shooters loaded their rifles with one cartridge at a time.

Our top shooter was Bob DeLisle, shooting his old Model '92 Winchester in .32-20 and his Ruger Vaquero in .45 Colt. I was just five points behind Bob, taking 2nd place with my long barreled .44/40 rifle and my Uberti #3 New Model in .44 Russian. We'll hold this match again, probably with different targets, in August.

Old Style .22 Match

What happens when you take away a Buffalo Runners black powder cartridge rifle, lever gun and pistol? He grabs his trusty .22 rifle. For many, our first .22 was a "coming of age" and the graduation from the BB gun. It was that way for me and these many years later, shooting a .22 just never gets old.

"Loco" Jeff Ritter was scheduled to be the match director for this event. Unfortunately, Jeff fell ill just prior to this shoot and was unable to fill that role. We wish Jeff a speedy recovery and a quick return to the range. I stepped in as our match director and the result was twofold. First, it was a lot of fun and that's because we're out shooting .22's. Secondly, I believe I might be on target selection probation for a while. Here's how the match went.

The complete match totaled fifty rounds at four paper targets and a series of five gongs. The gongs were one at 25 yards, one at 50 yards, two at 75 yards and one at 100 yards. Two shots at each for a total of 10 shots. We used two targets at 50 yards. The first being a single 10-inch bull-seye target. The second 50-yard target was a California X, also with 10 inches of scoring rings. The California X was shot from the siting position while using cross-sticks. All of the other targets were shot from the offhand position, or "awful-handed." Ten shots at each target for a total of 20 shots. There were also two targets at 25 yards. First, a single bullseye of approximately five inches. Lastly, the circle target. This one will take some explaining.

On a "legal" size piece of white paper (8.5" x 14") there were fifteen evenly spaced circles of approximately two and a half inches. Inside each circle is a dot and under each circle is a numeric value. The smaller the dot, the higher the value. One shot per circle. Your choice was for ten of the fifteen circles. Hit the dot and win the score value indicated. Now, at about ten yards this target looks really fun and challenging. In its position at 25 yards, not much could be seen. Of the eight shooters in this match, only four posted a scoring hit. And only one had more than one hit. Ralph Birmingham had two. That was luck! It's a tough target indeed.

As with our Old West Centerfires matches, we attempt to maintain adherence to the black powder loads. Rimfire .22's can be an exception as far as ammo goes. However, we do encouraged shooters to use single shot drop block or rolling block rifles, typical of the .22s back in the 1880s.

When the dust settled, Bob Delisle was this year's winner with a score of 400-9X. Bob was shooting a Savage/Stevens Model 72 "Crackshot." Second was Allen Cunniff with a score of 391-5X while shooting a Hopkins & Allen reproduction from C. Sharps Arms. In third place was Mike Nesbitt with a score of 353-2X, shooting an 1885 Winchester Low Wall reproduction from C. Sharps Arms. I placed fourth with 351-2X using my original Remington #4 Rolling Block. Dan Johnson was fifth with a 308-X shooting a Remington 580 single shot. Phil Weibe was sixth with 288-X also shooting a Hopkins & Allen reproduction from C. Sharps Arms. Seventh was Ralph Birmingham with a score of 176-X. Ralph was using an old Stevens Favorite. Our eighth shooter was Tom Brown with another Stevens Favorite posting 140.

This is the time of the year when many of these Buffalo Runners get all wound up inside at the thought of going to Forsyth in Montana Territory to shoot what is billed as "The biggest rifle shooting event in eastern Montana since the Custer Massacre." We will have no less than six shooters form Capitol City Rifle & Pistol Club's, Black River Buffalo Runners represented at the 30th Annual Matthew Quigley Buffalo Rifle Match. This match has targets from the bucket at 350 yards, shot standing without support (off hand), to the mighty buffalo at 805 yards. This Old West Centerfires match is a final "tune up" for the Quigley match which will take place on June 18th and 19th. Part of that tune up is getting used to certain requirements for the event. For once Curt Lokovsek shot from a seated position in competition because Curt's favored prone position is not allowed at Quigley. Curt did a nice job today shooting from a set of base mounted shooting sticks provided by Warren Kerr, son of the late Don Kerr. Thanks Warren. The legacy lives on.

Let's see how these Buffalo Runners did at this match. The course of fire was our standard aggregate setup which includes ten shots at 100 yards at a single-bullseye target, followed by ten more shots at 200 yards on another single bullseye target. You may recall from earlier reports our 200-yard target had changed this year to a target with smaller scoring rings to increase the difficulty and spread the scores. It appears this approach is working and no doubt will have an impact on the yearly aggregate.

Our top shooter on this day was Allen Cunniff with a score of 191-3X. Allen was shooting an 1874 Shiloh Sharps in .45/90. Good job Allen. Our number two shooter was Curt Lokovsek, on his seat, shooting over tall sticks with his Remington Hepburn in .45/90, posting a 189-4X. "Loco" Jeff Ritter came in third place scoring a 185-4X with his .45/90 Remington Roll-

ing Block. In fourth place was Mike Nesbitt with 162-X. Mike was shooting 'Hefty Hanna," a heavy C. Sharps Arms .44/77. Rounding out the top five with his .45/70 Pedersoli was Bob DeLisle posting a 157.

In sixth place was Mike Moran shooting an 1874 C. Sharps Arms, .45/70, for a score of 168. JerryMayo (that would be me) came in seventh-place, shooting a 150-2X using another 1874 C. Sharps Arms rifle in .45/70. Eighth place went to Tom Witt with a 150 using yet one more 1874 C. Sharps Arms in .45/70. Will Ulry came in ninth with his Shiloh Sharps in .45/70 posting a 131 and Mark Davis come in tenth place with 113 points also using a Shiloh Sharps in .45/70.
