ANNUAL PAPER PATCHED BULLET MATCH by Jerry Mayo



We had ten shooters on the range for this match. seven of which would be using paper patched bullets of their own making. We also had three shooters, all of whom shot paper patched, needing to submit scores from targets fired on a day previous to the match. These targets were shot in the presence of approved witnesses. Scores were verified prior to leaving the range and maintained by the Match Director until the day of the shoot. This is an acceptable practice in accordance with our rules. The remaining three shooters not firing paper patch bullets would be scored separately. Let's take a look at how it all played out. Our top shooter on this day using his 1874 C. Sharps Arms rifle in .50/70 was Allen Cunniff with an amazing 192-6X. Allen had a 99-5X at

100 yards! Great Shooting, Allen!!

In second-place was Bob DeLisle. Bob shot a 173 with his 1874 Pedersoli Sharps in .45/70. Our third-place shooter was me, Jerry Mayo, with an 1874 C. Sharps Arms .45/70 firing a 164. Tom Witt came in fourth using his '74 Bridgeport Model, also by C. Sharps Arms, in .45/70 for a score of 159. Rounding out the top five is Phil Allen's 100-yard target, scoring 99-5X Wiebe with a 158. Phil was shooting his 1885 C. Sharps Arms High Wall in .38/50 Remington caliber.

Three shooters participated today using grease grove bullets. In first place was "Loco" Jeff Ritter shooting a 74 Shiloh Sharps in .40/65. Jeff scored a 177. In second was Mike Holeman using his Remington Rolling Block in .45/70 posting a score of 159. And in third place was "Doc" Jeff Ritter with his Gemmer/Springfield trapdoor .50/70. Doc shot a 104-X and this was the first time had tried this rifle at 200 yards.

Nine shooters came out for our April monthly match on the Capitol City Rifle & Pistol Club's Black Powder Range. The rifle course this month was four paper targets, one each at 25, 50, 75 and 100 yards with five shots to be fired at each target. This match got underway at 09:30 after a brief safety meeting and, in the spirit of the day, I called the line hot before any targets were posted. Amongst questions of my mental capacities (which are truly questionable), the quicker among the shooters figured out the ruse and a laugh was had by all. The "Three Amigos" took the top three places with Bob DeLisle coming in 1st with a score of 154 -X, followed by Jerry Mayo with a 129 and then Mike Nesbitt with a 118. At least he waited for a rainy day to shoot his flintlock again. (Mike's rifle is pictured below.) Fourth-place went to Will Ulry with a 112, followed by Derek Sotelo, who shot this match with his new .45 caliber flintlock rifle. (I'll quit giving their scores because they are all below 100.) Sixth-place went to "Loco" Jeff Ritter followed by Frank Ponceroff. Then eighth and ninth places went to Ralph Birmingham and Art Sporseen, respectively.

Trade guns were chosen for the after-match with five shooters taking up the challenge. For the after-match pot each shooter chips in a dollar and the winner takes all. Bob DeLisle was,

APRIL LEVER-GUN MATCH

The Lever Gun Match went off without a hitch this month, no thanks to me. A few days before the match a very beautifully crafted email reminding everyone of the shoot, with all the details and the course of fire, was never sent. Next time I will make sure to push the "send" button. In spite of my challenges with technology, we had nine shooters show-up ready for some fun on the range. We even had a visit from our friendly neighborhood deer, a young doe, stopping by to inspect the range for us before the festivities were under way.

We decided to shake things up a bit and shoot the after-match first. I guess you could call it shooting the "pre-match." We shot our sixguns at a small two-bull target at a distance of 12 paces. When the smoke cleared Mike Nesbitt and Jerry Mayo were only two points apart at 85 and 83 respectively! (Both of them were shooting revolvers in .44 Russian caliber.) Careful examination of Mike's target and with the help of an over-lay it was determined that Mike beat Jerry by two points with a score of 85 whereas Mike had claimed only 84. That was really good shooting for both Mike and Jerry.

This was mostly a paper match with some gongs thrown in for good measure. We shot the double bull buffalo at 50 yards and the single bull buffalo at 75 yards. Both targets proved to be challenging for me even with the use of my cross-sticks. This was not the case for everyone, Jeff Ritter shot a 92-XX with his .38-55 followed closely by Mike Nesbitt who shot a 91-XX with his .44-40 at 50 yards. The 75-yard target had Jeff Ritter shooting an 87-XX with Jerry Mayo hot on his tail with an 81. The gongs were shot at 50 and 100 yards offhand, and they were ringing! Bob DeLisle shot nine out of ten gongs with his .32-20 while Jerry Mayo, with another .44-40, and Mike Nesbitt each rang eight out of ten.



I took the chance and shot at the mini moon out at 100 yards (it was optional) and hit it! I should have made it worth extra points... Maybe next time.

THE BLACK RIVER BUFFALO RUNNERS INVITE YOU TO OUR 6TH AND BEST BUFFALO CAMP MAY 19, 20 & 21, 2023

For black powder cartridge shooting, 1870s style. Shooting events include buffalo rifles such as the Sharps, the Springfields, and the Remington rolling blocks plus other large bore (.375" bore or larger) single shots with black powder loads and lead bullets. We also have an event for the "camp guns" such as the Winchester Model 1866s and 1873s. Later repeaters will also be acceptable in black powder calibers, with black powder loads. A black powder revolver match on the trail will be for both percussion and black powder cartridge sixguns. (If you want to participate in the revolver match, please bring a holster for your sixgun.) Prizes will be awarded to the top three shooters in each event, plus aggregate prizes to all shooters who enter the aggregate based on rifle scores. The Buffalo Rifles will be used in a Little Quigley Match at 200 yards, sitting position while shooting over X-sticks and at 100 yards offhand "at the bucket" on Saturday. No sighter shots or fouling shots. (If sighting-in is necessary that can be done on Friday, May 14th.) Following the Little Quigley Match we'll use our "camp guns" or the buffalo rifles for a "Meat Hunt" at selected targets on the muzzleloading trail-walk, all shots taken offhand. (Muzzleloading rifles can be used on the "meat hunt.") The "meat hunt" must be completed by noon on Sunday. Twenty shots are needed for the "Little Quigley Match" and sixteen more for the "Meat Hunt." Also, at least ten cartridges for the revolvers will be need. But bring more ammo than that just for the fun of it. Beginning this year, we'll be holding a "Reloader's Workshop" on Saturday afternoon where reloading can be discussed and tried, loaded in camp, then possibly shot on the High-Power range. If you have any questions on how to reload your black powder rifle cartridges, paper patched or grease-groove bullets, bring them to this Buffalo Camp. We'll hold the reloader's workshop at 3:00 Saturday afternoon, in camp. We also plan to show a movie Saturday evening in the clubhouse, maybe "Quigley." There are two camping areas, one for "canvas" and the other for campers, trailers and RVs. In the "canvas" area" we want the camp to look as much like the 1870s as possible, so please, no aluminum lawn chairs or portable TV sets. We will try to have a dinner on Saturday evening, hopefully with a cook out in the canvas area. (If the weather does not cooperate, we can move the dinner to inside the clubhouse.) Entry Fee: \$25 (or \$15 for single event) Camping Fee: \$11 per camp for the event Registrations can begin on May 19, 2023. Traders are welcome. MEMBERSHIP DUES RATES Dues and Renewal policies

Members will receive a statement 45 days before their membership expires. (Your renewal month is found on your mailing label.) The dues renewal date is the last day of the month in which members' "annual date" falls. Members' gate card will automatically "lock out" on their renewal date if they have not renewed, and their membership will be considered "inactive" for 30-days, during which time they may still pay their dues. After 30-days on "inactive" status the membership will be terminated. Should they wish to rejoin CCR&P past the 30-days "inactive" status, they must reapply as a new member and attend the Orientation class. Membership fees (taxes are additional), collected at the time of the orientation classes are:

Annual dues \$80.00 for the first member of each household and \$45.00 for each

additional eligible member of the household.

Initiation fee (one time) \$80.00 for each household and a refundable gate card deposit

fee of \$10.00 for each member.

In addition, each member is expected to devote 8 hours of volunteer service annually

or recruit two new members or pay an assessment of \$80.00.

Orientation class (required)

(<u>GUESTS:</u> Members may bring their spouses and children under the age of 18 years old <u>as guests</u> as often as they'd like. Non-immediate family member guests are limited to two visits annually. Members **MUST** accompany their guests at all times, including spouses and children, and are responsible for the conduct of their guests.)
