Lever Gun Match By Tom Witt

We had great weather and a new target system, thanks to the hard work of Mike Nesbitt, Jerry Mayo, Bob DeLisle, Allen Cunniff, and me, Tom Witt. We spent most of Thursday putting in new posts and rope on the "Bob Gietz Black Powder Range." If you are in the neighborhood sometime, stop by and take a look, just <u>PLEASE</u> don't shoot the posts.

The rifle match consisted of three paper targets shot at 25 yards, 50 yards, and 75 yards.

The 25-yard target was a turkey target shot while standing on our hind legs, offhand. It has a miserably small 10-ring which made it hard to hit. This didn't seem to slow Allen Cunniff, probably because he could see! He managed to score a 96-3X and that was followed rather closely by Jerry Mayo with a score of 94-XX. Bob DeLisle and Mike Holeman placed 3rd and 4th at 25 yards with scores of 88-6X and 88-3X respectively.

Next came the 50-yard challenge. We had a double-bullseye buffalo target shot from the sitting position while using cross-sticks. This is a target we have faced many times before so it was no surprise that Allen Cunniff had the high score with a 93-XX followed by Mike Nesbitt's score of 90. Third place was claimed by Bob DeLise, using his Model 1892 Winchester in .32-20 caliber with a score of 84-X.



We finished shooting lever-guns with a Buffalo at 75 yards, again from the sitting position while using our cross-sticks. This is the first time we have faced this target; Jeff "Loco" Ritter was high scorer here with 88 Followed by me with 84-XX and Allen Cunniff scoring 3rd place at 75 yards with a score of 82. The morning's shooting was concluded with an after-match, which is not included in the day's aggregate. This month we dusted off our scatterguns and fired 10 shots at aerial clay targets. Witnessing the day's activities was new club member John Stanislay. John was quickly put to work scoring the hits with the shotguns and he also grabbed the camera and took our group picture. Thank you, John! Tom Witt, that's me again, shot the most clays with a score of 6 hits followed by Bob DeLise who shot 4. Mike Nesbitt, Jerry Mayo, Allen Cuniff and Ralph Birmingham all shot 2 clays. Ralph was the only one shooting a muzzleload-

ing flintlock and still managed to hit 2 clays. Way to go Ralph!

BUFFALO CAMP, 2023 by Mike Nesbitt

Buffalo Camp has black powder cartridge events which include; the Little Quigley Match held on the High-Power range, the "Meat Hunt" which is shot on the black powder trail-walk, and the Revolver Match which is also shot on the black powder trail-walk. Some grand shooting was done in each of those events.

Our top shooter in the Little Quigley Match was, again, Allen Cunniff and he clobbered 17 good hits on those targets with his 20 shots. Last year Allen got 19 hits through the same course of fire. Perhaps that difficulty in seeing the targets robbed Allen of two of his hits although none of his missed shots were at 200 yards. Where Allen perfected his missing was at the small "bucket" target which is fired at offhand from 100 yards.

Second in the Little Quigley Match was Mike Moran and in third place was Jerry Mayo. All very good shooting.

The next event at Buffalo Camp was our rather unique "Meat Hunt" which is shot with rifle from the 1870s such as the Uberti copies of the old Henry rifles, the 1866 Winchesters and the 1873 Winchester. The two most popular calibers for the meat hunt are the .44-40 and the .45 Colt, and loads for the match must be made up with cast bullets and black powder.

At the top of the list of shooters on the "Meat Hunt" we find Allen Cunniff again. He hit 14 out of 15, which is the very same score he had when he won this match last year. In second place on the "Meat Hunt" we find Tom Witt with his .44-40 in a Model 1873 Winchester rifle (copy by Uberti) with its 24-inch barrel. In third-place on the "Meat Hunt" was Bob DeLisle shooting his old Winchester Model 1892 Short Rifle in .32-20 caliber.

The scores from our Little Quigley Match and the "Meat Hunt" are added together to make the aggregate. Tom Brown did an excellent job handling registrations and he also ran the Little Quigley Match, dividing the shooters into relays and keeping the match organized.

That leaves the Revolver Match to tell you about. No one had hit all of the only ten targets until this year. A new record was set for our Revolver Match and the shooter was me. I used my Uberti copy of the Smith & Wesson New Model #3 Frontier revolver shooting .44 Russian ammo. Tom Witt placed 2nd this year on the Revolver Match and Allen Cunniff 3rd.

Good prizes came from several sources. The list of prize contributors includes: C. Sharps Arms and continues with; SPG Sales, The Single Shot Exchange, John Walters, Wolfe Publishing Company, Accurate Molds, Mike Nesbitt, Ironhorse Industries (Snake Oil), Bob DeLisle, Dan Johnson, Allen Cunniff, Joel Miles and Will Ulry.

In the list of shooters' standings, some names are missing so let me explain. Shooters have the option of signing up for the aggregate or simply entering a single event. If they signed up for just a single event but then did not place in that event, they are not listed in the aggregate. That is why we had more shooters than our aggregate listing indicates.

Witt in 6th. Seventh place went to Ralph Birmingham with Clarence Atchison in 8th. Ninth place went to Will Ulry, 10th place to Tim Sampson. Eleventh place was taken by Mickey Hamilton and 12th place by Frank Ponceroff. Cody Mehr took 13th, 14th place went to Mike Moran, 15th place to Mike Holeman and 16th to Lawrence Saltarelli. Seventeeth place was taken by Art Sporseen and 18th by Doug Dickman. Ayla Hamilton came in at 19th place while 20th place went to Jeff Ritter. Josh Brown took 21st place and George Kelly came in 22nd. Ken Hester placed 23rd, David Dickman was 24th, and Issac Hester came in 25th, leaving Dan Johnson to take 26th place. Shooter did not need to be present to place in those standings and many of the lower shooters only shot 1 to 3 matches, hence they're lower scoring.

MEMBERSHIP DUES RATES Dues and Renewal policies

Members will receive a statement 45 days before their membership expires. (Your renewal month is found on your mailing label.) The dues renewal date is the last day of the month in which members' "annual date" falls. Members' gate card will automatically "lock out" on their renewal date if they have not renewed, and their membership will be considered "inactive" for 30-days, during which time they may still pay their dues. After 30-days on "inactive" status the membership will be terminated. Should they wish to rejoin CCR&P past the 30-days "inactive" status, they must reapply as a new member and attend the Orientation class. Membership fees (taxes are additional), collected at the time of the orientation classes are:

Annual dues \$80.00 for the first member of each household and \$45.00 for each

additional eligible member of the household.

Initiation fee (one time) \$80.00 for each household and a refundable gate card deposit

fee of \$10.00 for each member.

In addition, each member is expected to devote 8 hours of volunteer service annually

or recruit two new members or pay an assessment of \$80.00.

Orientation class (required)

(<u>GUESTS:</u> Members may bring their spouses and children under the age of 18 years old <u>as guests</u> as often as they'd like. Non-immediate family member guests are limited to two visits annually. Members **MUST** accompany their guests at all times, including spouses and children, and are responsible for the conduct of their guests.)
