WINTER INDOOR .22 RIFLE SHOOTING

Beginning on Wednesday, November 1st, we will have the Indoor Range open each Wednesday evening for .22 rifle shooting. This will be every Wednesday evening from Nov. 1 to the end of March 2024. This will be for CCRP Club members only; the gate will not be open so you will need your club key card to get in the gate. There will be no charge for these Wednesday night sessions, but you must be a CCRP Club member.

The Indoor Range door will be open at 6:00 PM. Shooting will start at 6:30 PM. This will be a semiformal range session. We will have four 10-minute shooting sessions, with plenty of time between sessions to warm up by the wood stove and visit with your friends.

The firing line will be run by an NRA Certified Range Safety Officer. NRA A-17 50-foot rifle targets will be provided. If we run out of targets, we'll take up a small donation to buy more targets. You can bring your own targets if you want. You can shoot in any position you choose or set up a table and chair to shoot from the bench.

Any rifle chambered in .22 Short, .22 Long, or.22 Long Rifle may be used. No .22 Magnum or .17 caliber rimfires. Open sights or scopes may be used. This will be precision target shooting. No rapid fire "mag dumps" will be allowed.

Beginning in mid-December, several of us will form a team to participate in the National Rifle League "postal league". Any club member is welcome to join our team. If you don't want to shoot in the postal league, you can still come and shoot with us for recreation and fun.

Lever-Gun Match

The January lever gun match was certainly a cold one! We met on the Bob Gietz Black Powder Range at the Capitol City Rifle and Pistol Club. When registration got started at 9:00 am it was a balmy 18 degrees; we only had one pen that wanted to work in those temperatures.

When shooting got under way, we started at the 25-yard mark. The target selection was a bit different this month because I had to fall back to Plan B, which meant pulling targets from our stash inside the club house. Our lock on the range shed was frozen and we had no way to thaw it. The only target I could find for 25 yards was the "nightmare target" which we usually reserve for muzzle-loaders. Mike Nesbitt said if we ever use that target again, he would have no choice but to complain. As you can see from the scores below, my gun was shooting nice groups to the left of each critter just outside the scoring rings. And even Mike Nesbitt did hit a couple of the critters' heads.

When it came to the 50-yard target we allowed the use of cross-sticks, however, several of us have cross-sticks with spikes that need to be pounded into the ground. Allen Cuniff mentioned that somebody should invent cross-sticks that screw together and don't need to be stuck in the ground. It's nice to know that we have a wise guy in every crowd. There wasn't much difference between the concrete and the dirt so I had to improvise and hold my gun next to my sticks with a finger wrapped around the barrel and the stick. It worked pretty well except for the fact that was holding my sight picture at the wrong elevation, which lead to another low score. I got my shots closer to the bullseye at 50 yards but as you can see, I still have a need for lot of range-time to do with my 1873. After this month's match, I think I can give Mike some pointers on proper complaining. At least I didn't take 8th place.

Allen Cunniff turned in the top scores on the 25- and 50-yard targets but Mike Nesbitt figured out what he was doing in time to shoot the best target at 75 yards. And we might say it was a day for .44-40s because that was what everybody used except Bob DeLisle with his .32-20. The top three shooters were, Allen Cunniff in 1st place, second was taken by Mike Holeman, and Mike Nesbitt grabbed 3rd place. Those three were awarded "meat prizes" and then everyone was awarded prizes from the Buffalo Runners in order of their scores.

For the after-match, we brought back the .22 revolvers. We shot 10 rounds at 12 paces with some pretty good scores! Allen Cuniff bested me with an X. I guess it just wasn't my day but don't let all my whining fool you, I had a lot of fun as did everyone else.

We did have some fine shooting despite the cold as the scores below show.

First OWC Match for 2024

It is a new year and that means it is time to start a new aggregate season for these Black River Buffalo Runners. And they were ready to get after it. The patience of all these buffalo runners was tested with the changes in format instituted for this season. Everyone took it with a great attitude because that's the way these folks are. The air was cool and clean, with just enough of a breeze to keep the range fairly clear. So, let's see how it all played out.

Our top shooter for the day was Dick Elliot with a score of 193-5X, his first time to shoot with us. Dick used a Browning Highwall in .40/65 caliber. Our number two shooter was Ken Kurfurst with 189-4X using his '78 Sharps Borchardt chambered in .45/90. Third was Curt Lokovsek scoring 187-4X with his '74 Farmingdale Shiloh, also in .45/90. Behind Curt in fourth-place was Allen Cunniff shooting his '74 C. Sharps Arms in .50/70, using paper patched bullets, firing a 179. Rounding out the top five, just one point behind Allen, was Jerry Johnson with a 178 using his '74 Shiloh in .45/70.

For our after-match this month we went to one of our favorites, revolvers. The revolver must fire black powder, lead cast bullets and preferably be of a style and caliber specific to the Old West period. The target is ten-and-one half inches square with a five-and-one-half inch bullseye placed at 10 yards.

This match is a 'winner takes all.' The winner this time was Jerry Johnson with a score of 100-2X. Jerry was the only shooter not using a black powder cartridge revolver. He used his .36 caliber cap and ball that was not as loud or smoky as the others but it sure knew where the 10 ring was. Good shooting Jerry! See Jerry's target to the right.

Indoor Air Gun Matches at CCR&P

There are two types of indoor air rifle matches at CCR&P.

There is Air Rifle Benchrest which is shot from a bench rest at targets 50 feet away. The course of fire is four targets of 25 record shots. Time for each target is 20 minutes. Match is a total of 100 record shots plus any sighters. Shooters compete in two classes; Air rifles that are spring powered (SPR) or by compressed air [precharged pneumatic (PCP) which includes single stroke pneumatic (SSP)].

The other Air Rifle match is a Field Target match which is also shot indoors at 50 feet. The targets are similar to silhouette shooting but have a hole varying in size in which the shooter has to shoot through to trigger a lever the causes the silhouette to fall down. The match is 40 shots for score. The shooters shoot twice at 20 targets. There are two classes; Field Target which is shot from a sitting position and Hunter Field Target where the shooter can use support sticks/cross sticks and sit on a stool.

These events are designed to give air rifle shooters the opportunity to test both the accuracy of their equipment and their individual skills in a friendly, competitive atmosphere away from the outside weather conditions. These events are generally held once a month on Saturdays from October through March. Check the Club's calendar and come on out and give it a try. The Fall .22 cal Precision Pistol League Starts October 2, 2023

The .22 cal Precision Pistol League is on Monday nights with a 6:30 and 7:30 pm relay. The shooting is done at 50 feet at the Indoor Range at targets with a bullseye (black center section). Course of fire consist of 60 rounds for score. There are three shooting sequences/types: Slow Fire (10 rounds in ten minutes), Timed Fire (5 rounds in 20 seconds) and Rapid Fire (5 rounds in 10 seconds). Twenty rounds are shot in each type. The shooting is done one-handed with open (iron) or optical sights (red dot or scope). Shooters may use a semi-auto or revolver however it is more difficult to shoot a revolver in Rapid Fire. Shooters may shoot with both hands for fun. The League runs for 11 weeks. Shooters submit 10 scores to be eligible for league awards. The League is NRA Sanctioned. The League cost is \$50.

MEMBERSHIP DUES RATES Dues and Renewal policies

Members will receive a statement 45 days before their membership expires. (Your renewal month is found on your mailing label.) The dues renewal date is the last day of the month in which members' "annual date" falls. Members' gate card will automatically "lock out" on their renewal date if they have not renewed, and their membership will be considered "inactive" for 30-days, during which time they may still pay their dues. After 30-days on "inactive" status the membership will be terminated. Should they wish to rejoin CCR&P past the 30-days "inactive" status, they must reapply as a new member and attend the Orientation class. **Membership fees (taxes are additional)**, collected at the time of the orientation classes are:

Annual dues \$80.00 for the first member of each household and \$45.00 for each

additional eligible member of the household.

Initiation fee (one time) \$80.00 for each household and a refundable gate card deposit

fee of **\$10.00** for each member.

In addition, each member is expected to devote 8 hours of volunteer service annually

or recruit two new members or pay an assessment of \$80.00.

(<u>GUESTS</u>: Members may bring their spouses and children under the age of 18 years old <u>as guests</u> as often as they'd like. Non-immediate family member guests are limited to two visits annually. Members **MUST** accompany their guests at all times, including spouses and children, and are responsible for the conduct of their guests.)
