BUFFALO CAMP, 2024 by Mike Nesbitt

One part about Buffalo Camp that is getting to be rather repetitious is that Allen Cunniff won the Little Ouigley Match again. He's placed 1st in that match now for the fourth year in a row. This year he used another rifle, a '74 Sharps, by C. Sharps Arms, in .40-65 caliber while using paper patched bullets. Allen is a serious shooter, for sure, and he practices more, and more seriously, than most of us. With his .40-65 he shot a score of 180, that's 18 hits out of 20 shots. The only time a better score was turned in was a couple of years ago when Allen managed to shoot 19 hits in the same course of fire. Good doin's for Allen, that practice is certainly paying off.

Second in the Little Quigley Match was a new shooter, at least

new to Buffalo Camp. That was Jerry Johnson, shooting a Shiloh Sharps in .45-70 caliber. Jerry got 16 hits for a Little Quigley Score of 160. And in third place, in the Little Quigley Match, was

Tom Witt. Tom started shooting in Buffalo Camp a couple of years ago but this year he used his .45 Allen Cunniff, top shooter -90 Sharps rifle, by C. Sharps Arms, with paper patched bullets which was a first for him. His score

for 3rd place was a very respectable 150 for his 15 hits on those tough-to-hit targets. Mike Holeman also got 15 hits in the Little Quigley Match but Tom Witt's tiebreaker was just too good to beat. We'll be watching for Mike Holeman to place in this match next year.

We had some new shooters this year in addition to Jerry Johnson and they certainly should be mentioned. Larry Litten joined us and so did Kyle Kirkpatrick from Idaho.

For the Meat Hunt, again, Allen Cunniff's name is seen at the top of the list. But Bob DeLilse also "aced" the Meat Hunt trail, so tiebreakers were needed again. Then three shooters all tied for 3rd and it was Tom Witt who had the best tiebreaker to win that place.

On the revolver trail, it was Mike Moran who won with 8 hits and Jim Haeckel did well in getting seven hits. I also got seven hits and once again, the tiebreakers were reviewed and Jim's hit was just a fuzz closer than mine, so Jim took 2nd place with the six-guns.

Starting with this year's Buffalo Camp, the scores from the Black Powder Cartridge Revolver Match are included in the aggregate. That was the decision of our Match Director, Tom Brown. Previously, the revolver scores were not included in the aggregate because not all of our shooters had the revolvers to use but this year all shooters did participate in the revolver match. Including the revolver scores gives everybody a higher total score.

Some special mention must go to Joel Miles who comes to this match from Idaho. Joel didn't stay for the whole weekend, leaving soon after the Little Quigley Match was done. He had to hit the trail to another of such doin's, the big shoot down by Bend, Oregon, where he did well in getting a number of hits on the buffalo at 1200 yards! But before Joel left, he gave our club a fine gift, a gong which was complete with a stand. That gong can be seen in our group picture, positioned just above Will's big black dog, "C". Thank you, Joel, we'll be using that gong for sure. (Actually, as this is being written, we already have!)

May's Lever Gun Match

After a two-month break, the Bob Gietz Black Powder Range was once again the meeting place for our lever gun match! We had ten shooters enjoying the weather, which was great, at Capitol City Rifle and Pistol Club in Littlerock near Olympia. The sun was shining bright enough that some of the targets were a bit difficult to see.

This month we brought back the gongs! We had three of them set up at the 25-yard line and two more set up at the 50-yard line. There was a time limit to shoot 2 rounds at each one. I had it worked out in my head that each shooter should be able to get all 10 shots off in ten seconds, after all, that is a whole one second per shot. After some discussion and some experimentation, we decided that 60 seconds was a much better length of time to complete all 10 rounds. I guess some things work better in my head than in reality. The two Mikes, that is Mike Nesbitt and Mike Holeman, both hit 9 for a score of 90. There is an element of fun in loading up the magazine tube and rapidly shooting a black powder .44-40 lever-gun at those steel reactive targets.

We had a newcomer to the lever gun match, Cody Mehr. Cody isn't new to shooting but it was his first time to compete in our lever gun match. He was shooting an original Winchester '94 in .38-55 so you could say he had one of the coolest guns on the line.

The next target was a buffalo on paper at 50 yards. Cross-sticks from the sitting position were allowed, although in Jerry Johnson's case, a broom stick did work. Mike Nesbitt was top shot at 50 yards with a score of 82 followed by me with 81 and Mike Holeman with 80.

The next target was another buffalo, the single bullseye buffalo, at 75 yards, again cross-sticks were allowed while shooting from the sitting position. The sun was shining bright on this one which makes the sights hard to see. That didn't stop Bob Delisle and Allen Cuniff from both scoring 90XX and Mike Nesbitt hitting 90X!

The after-match was with shotguns, my favorite! I was shooting a little .410 side by side, a little beauty bought in a pawnshop years ago but had never fired it until this match. The brass cartridges were loaded with 25.5 grains of FFF GOEX black powder and 40 grains of 7 1/2 shot.

That little .410 gun didn't disappoint me, I hit 9 out of 10 clays to win the match! That gun is certainly a keeper!

Next month we will do pistols again for the after match. That will be on June 8th.

This was a paper match, our first target being a buffalo at 25 yards. This target is a bit challenging for most of us due to the fact that the highest scoring rings are small and difficult to see at any distance. The weather was favorable ant so was the light. I was able to score an 84! It always helps when you can see the sights. Mike Holeman followed closely with a score of 82. Bob Delisle's target is easily scored at 78 points thanks to the flat nose bullets he shoots with his 32/20.

The second target of the day was another buffalo but at 50 yards. This one has two bullseyes on it so we shot 5 rounds per bullseye. Bob Delisle had the best score of 92-3X followed closely by Jerry Mayo with a score of 90-2X. I had to settle for third place at this distance with a score of 86-2X.

Our final target was yet another buffalo but now at 75 yards. This one had one large bullseye. Jerry Mayo took the top score at this distance with a score of 87-X. Bob Delisle was second with a score of 76. Mike Holeman finished third for this target with a score of 75.

The after-match was shot with revolvers. We had a small target with two bullseyes which we shot with 5 rounds with our left hand at one bullseye and 5 rounds with our right hand at the other bullseye. We have done this type of shooting before and it has been met with mixed reviews. This time Mike Holeman suggested it and it was no wonder why, he won the match with a score of 72! That is some pretty good shooting.

This was a fun day. The weather was good and so was our shooting. Next month we will be shooting our black powder lever-guns on the 13th of July. Come and join us even if you don't have a lever gun, I am sure that there is one you can borrow.

For the after-match this month we continued our exercise of preparation for the Quigley match. We used our Buffalo rifles which must fire black powder and lead cast bullets. The two targets we used were the buffalo at 200 yards, scaled to appear in the sights as the actual 805-yard target, and the infamous "Bucket" set at 100 yards, also in scale to appear in the sights as the actual 350 -yard target. The course of fire was five shots at the buffalo from the seated position with cross-sticks and five shots offhand at the bucket.

This match is a "winner takes all" and a hearty congratulation goes to Jerry Johnson as this month's winner. Jerry almost aced the course only missing his second attempt at the offhand bucket for a score of nine hits out of ten shots with his Sharps .45-70. That was some might fine shooting.

For the next Old West Centerfires match we will be shooting our final specialty match of the year. That will be the Old Style .22 Match will be held on 6 July, on the Black Powder range.

MEMBERSHIP DUES RATES Dues and Renewal policies

Members will receive a statement 45 days before their membership expires. (Your renewal month is found on your mailing label.) The dues renewal date is the last day of the month in which members' "annual date" falls. Members' gate card will automatically "lock out" on their renewal date if they have not renewed, and their membership will be considered "inactive" for 30-days, during which time they may still pay their dues. After 30-days on "inactive" status the membership will be terminated. Should they wish to rejoin CCR&P past the 30-days "inactive" status, they must reapply as a new member and attend the Orientation class. **Membership fees (taxes are additional)**, collected at the time of the orientation classes are:

Annual dues \$80.00 for the first member of each household and \$45.00 for each

additional eligible member of the household.

Initiation fee (one time) \$80.00 for each household and a refundable gate card deposit

fee of \$10.00 for each member.

In addition, each member is expected to devote 8 hours of volunteer service annually

or recruit two new members or pay an assessment of \$80.00.
