Old West Centerfires

Once again, our Black River Buffalo Runners gather to increase those yearly aggregate scores as our 2025 season draws nearer to its conclusion. This day would be the fourth of our six aggregate events for the year with only the penultimate event coming on September 6th and the final match on November 15th. Although the dog days of summer were setting in, the attendance at this match was outstanding as seventeen of our Buffalo Runners graced the range to show their skills.

Our seventeen Buffalo Runners enjoyed a beautiful day for shooting and took the opportunity to post some impressive scores. For this match we had one shooter needing to submit scores from targets fired on a day previous to the match. That was Mike Holeman and his targets were shot in the presence of approved witnesses. Scores were verified prior to leaving the range and maintained by the Match Director until the day of the shoot.



The course of fire on this day was our standard aggregate setup which consists of ten shots at 100 yards at a single-bullseye target, ten more shots at 200 yards on a larger single bullseye target. The targets may be shot in any order the shooter chooses. Cartridges must be loaded with black powder and lead cast bullets. Shooting is done from the seated position with cross-sticks, just like they do at Quigley. The match is shot in thirty-minute relays in which all twenty scoring shots must be fired. Fouling shots are allowed.

Our after-match was won with a cap & ball revolver, with a score of 99-6X. That's really hard to beat. And the next Old West Centerfires Match is in September.

August M1 Garand Match

It was a toasty hot day for the August M1 Garand Match. The rifle is officially known as the "U.S. Rifle Cal. .30 M1". The weather is officially known as "The Range is HOT". We had 10 shooters show up for a good match. That is the most people we have had in several years. Thanks for coming out!

It was a close match between 1st and 2nd place, separated by only 5 points. Tom Schuettke took the win with a score of 447-4X with his 80-year-old rifle. Gary Thorson took second - his rifle is only 70 years old.

Indoor .22 Rifle Shooting Starts in November

Beginning on the first Wednesday evening of November, we will have the Indoor Range open to CCRP Club members for .22 rifle shooting. It will be open each Wednesday evening through the end of March. The doors will be open at 6:00 PM, and shooting will start at 6:30 PM.

This activity is open to CCRP Club Members only, and there will be no charge for using the range. You will need your key card to get in the gate.

This is an opportunity for club members to practice your rifle skills through the rainy winter months. This is a semi-formal range session. The firing line is controlled by an NRA certified Range Safety Officer. We will have four 10-minute firing sessions, with plenty of time between sessions to change targets, talk with friends, and warm up next to the wood stove.

You can use any .22 rifle that you want with either open sights, red dot, or scope. Scopes work best if they can focus down to 50 feet. Ammo must be .22 Short, Long, or Long Rifle. No .22 Magnum or any other rimfire calibers are allowed.

Those of us "regulars" usually shoot a 4-position course of fire consisting of:

Prone position – 10 shots in 10 minutes

Sitting position – 10 shots in 10 minutes

Kneeling position – 10 shots in 10 minutes

Standing position - 10 shots in 15 minutes

You can shoot the "positions" with us, or you can shoot from any position you want for practice. You can also set up a table and shoot from the bench if you want. It's all about coming out and having some fun.

Some of us also form a team and compete in a 4-position .22 Rifle League, where our scores are emailed to the league each week. You are welcome to join the league with us, or just come out and shoot for fun and practice. The NRA A-17 target shown below is provided for a nominal charge. You are also welcome to bring your own targets.



July CMP/NRA Service Rifle Match

We had a great turnout on Sunday, July 27 with 9 shooters on the line for the July CMP/NRA Service Rifle Match. We really appreciate Jerry Johnson, Marcus Custer, Tom Hay, and Steve Ellery coming out to join us. We hope you had as much fun as we did.

Tom has been competing in NRA sanctioned high power rifle matches for the past several years and has recently earned Master classification in High Power Rifle Across-the-Course, which consists of shooting at 200, 300, and 600 yards.

We finished the day with the Carbine Match. This match is shot at 50 yards, and consists of 5 shots standing, 5 shots kneeling, and 10 shots prone, all in a time limit of 1 minute. We run the course twice, for a total of 40 rounds. We used 25-yard pistol targets placed out at 50 yards. Hits in the black were 1 point, and hits in the white were 0.

Tom Schuettke won the match with 36 hits our of a possible 40.

August's Lever-Gun Match

Some people might think that our Lever-Gun Matches are all the same but, oh no, there are some very easily seen and enjoyable differences. This month's Lever-Gun Match was not an aggregate match so we didn't need to stay with the three paper targets and we could "re-write the script" to make things more fun. And fun they were! It all began with a gong shoot, down on the Black Powder Range, and there's quite a bit to tell.

The gong shoot had five gongs set up; three of them at 25 yards and the other two out at 50 yards, with two shots each for a total of ten shots. Those might seem rather close for shooting at with rifles but there is a slight catch; the shooters to hit all of the gongs within 60 seconds.

This is done just one shooter at a time. The shooters would stand out just in front of our normal firing line (where the shotgun shooters usually stand) and load their lever-guns with all ten rounds. Then the timer would be started when the first shot was fired. Bob DeLisle got 9 hits, for 90 points, and he did it in 26 seconds.

After taking the gongs down, we shot at the turkey target posted at 25 yards for ten shots, offhand. Allen Cunniff was the top shooter this time with a score of 95-2X. Next, we fired ten more shots at the buffalo target, posted at 50 yards, shooting from the sitting position while using X-sticks. Allen was top shooter again but this time I was tied with him, we both had 92.

That completed our 30-shot match. Now we look forward to another aggregate match for Lever-Guns in September. Come and join us, these matches are truly habit forming.

MEMBERSHIP DUES RATES <u>Dues and Renewal policies</u>

Members will receive a statement 45 days before their membership expires. (Your renewal month is found on your mailing label.) The dues renewal date is the last day of the month in which members' "annual date" falls. Members' gate card will automatically "lock out" on their renewal date if they have not renewed, and their membership will be considered "inactive" for 30-days, during which time they may still pay their dues. After 30-days on "inactive" status the membership will be terminated. Should they wish to rejoin CCR&P past the 30-days "inactive" status, they must reapply as a new member and attend the Orientation class. Membership fees (taxes are additional), collected at the time of the orientation classes are:

Annual dues \$80.00 for the first member of each household and \$45.00 for each

additional eligible member of the household.

Initiation fee (one time) \$80.00 for each household and a refundable gate card deposit

fee of \$10.00 for each member.

In addition, each member is expected to devote 8 hours of volunteer service annually

or recruit two new members or pay an assessment of \$80.00.

Orientation class (required)

(<u>GUESTS:</u> Members may bring their spouses and children under the age of 18 years old <u>as quests</u> as often as they'd like. Non-immediate family member guests are limited to two visits annually. Members **MUST** accompany their guests at all times, including spouses and children, and are responsible for the conduct of their guests.)
